"It's going to fall back on the taxpayer anyway," he said, "through our allotment to the Library Board and to the Cubs and Scouts."

Coun. Norman Crawford agreed that would be a practical solution. "But we just can't give some \$700 out directly," he said.

Mr. Whitworth said the Library Board at a recent meeting felt it could assume a slight increase in the cost of rental.

In other business, council noted that tenders are to be received for the resurfacing of Highway 6 through the village up to Monday, Sept. 25 at 5 p.m. Cost of the project has been estimated at \$30,000.

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Chalmers' To Celebrate 130th Anniversary

The congregation of Chalmers' Presbyterian Church, Walpole, will be celebrating the 130th anniversary of the church this Sunday, Sept. 17. The worship service is at 11 a.m.

There will be special music for the service by the Bousfield Trio.

The guest speaker for the service will be Rev. R. Malcolm Ransom, director of education for mission in the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Mr. Ransom has recently from a study leave after 10 years of service on the staff of the General Board of Missions.

He spent the leave in Japan, Taiwan and Hong Kong, observing the churches at work in those areas.

Mr. Ransom was born in Westmount, Que., and is a graduate of McGill University. He studied at the Presbyterian College, Montreal and at Princeton Theological Seminary in Princeton, New Jersey, where he obtained his B.Th. degree.

He was appointed to China in 1942 as a missionary working with the Church of Christ in China. He and his wife attended the college of

Chinese studies at the University of California for language study and when war prevented their departure for China, Mr. Ransom became missionary secretary of the National Study Christian Movement of Canada for a period of two years.

The Ransoms finally reached China in 1946 where they pioneered a new field in the southern province of Yunnan near the border of what is now North Vietnam.

In late 1950 he returned to Canada and was for seven years minister of Knox and St. Andrew's churches in Fort Erie.

In 1958 he was appointed to the position of assistant secretary for overseas missions. He became acting director of missionary education in January 1966.

Mr. Ransom will be remaining following the anniversary service to serve, along with others, on a panel

discussion on the theme World Mission Begins In Your Home.
