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## Caledonia Corvairs To Open Training Camp In Hamilton

CALEDONIA - With the announcement the Caledonia Junior C Corvairs will open their training camp on Sept. 22, the next few weeks promise to be hectic ones for coach Chester Martindale. The training camp schedule is set up for five sessions at the Hamilton Forum. Martindale said, "Camp will start on Sept. 22 with a team meeting at the Caledonia town hall at 7:30 p.m., to be followed by our first work-out at 10 p.m. Our next four sessions go as follows: Tuesday, Sept. 26 at 10:30 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 3 at 10:30 p.m., Thursday, Oct. 5 at 10:30 p.m. and Tuesday, Oct. 10 at 10:30 p.m. All our practices follow Junior A hockey games. It's the only ice time in the city we could get."

Outlining the number of players generally expected at camp, the Corvair coach said, "We have camp invitations out now to approximately 34 players. All have either played

for the Corvairs before or played in the Caledonia Minor Hockey Association last year. In addition to that, we have letters going out to 15 or more imports. We'll also be scouting in both the Hamilton and Brantford Junior B camps this fall to see what we might be able to pick up. "All practices will have the players wearing full gear," explained Martindale. "We'll be splitting one hour's ice time into a 15 or 20 minute exercise and skating session, and then using about 40 minutes for practice scrimmage. We hope to have ice by Oct. 15 in the Caledonia Arena to practice on. By that time, the roster will be trimmed down to about 25 players. From there, we hope to have a few exhibition games prior to our opener on Oct. 29 against St. Thomas. We'll make our final cuts during that time."

Looking at last year's roster, Martindale will lose five players be-

cause of over-age and university. As of now, he must definitely find replacements at two defence positions and a complete forward line. And he could be forced into finding talent to fill several more holes following the Junior A and B camps.

The Corvairs have at least seven of last year's players in A and B training camps right now, and Martindale must wait for the results there before he can really evaluate his needs this year.

But it's shaping up to be perhaps the most interesting training camp the Corvairs have had in the past several seasons. Playing out of Junior C this year, the Corvairs are allowed to use four imports.

Martindale was quoted earlier as saying those four hockey players should be the best on your hockey club. He's got at least 15 imports coming to camp. Add to that the try-outs from last

year's Ontario Midget championship team in Caledonia, then throw in the returning Corvair veterans, and you've got a lot of talent fighting it out for at least five and maybe more positions on the 1972-73 edition. It's certainly not the atmosphere for the meek or complacent.

As the Corvair coach said, "Don't be surprised to see a lot of new faces in the Corvair line-up this year."
