Mohawk Institute Plans Attacked

A defeated candidate for chief of the Six Nations Indian Reserve was recently slammed in a proposal to turn the 100 year old Mohawk Institute over to the Association of Iroquois and Allied Indians.

This would be for use as an Indian cultural and resource centre, and Alton Van Avery charged that the planned centre would benefit interested non-Indians more than reserve members.

Kin Drop In Well Attended

Many sightseers sat the entire afternoon of Saturday, Sept. 16 watching the skydiving and sport parachuting events held at Parkview School grounds in Hagersville.

This event was sponsored by the local Kinsmen Club, and is part of their Drop In events.

He said the council has leased the institute because it was anxious to get something started in the vacant building.

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A delegate will be sent to the Area Convention at Park Motor Hotel Niagara Falls on Nov. 6 and 7.

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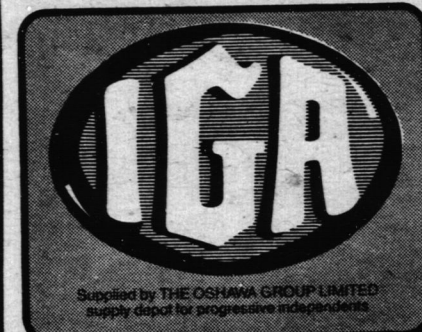

This once again is evidence that the more an organization grows, the more effective it can be. Haldimand's membership now stands

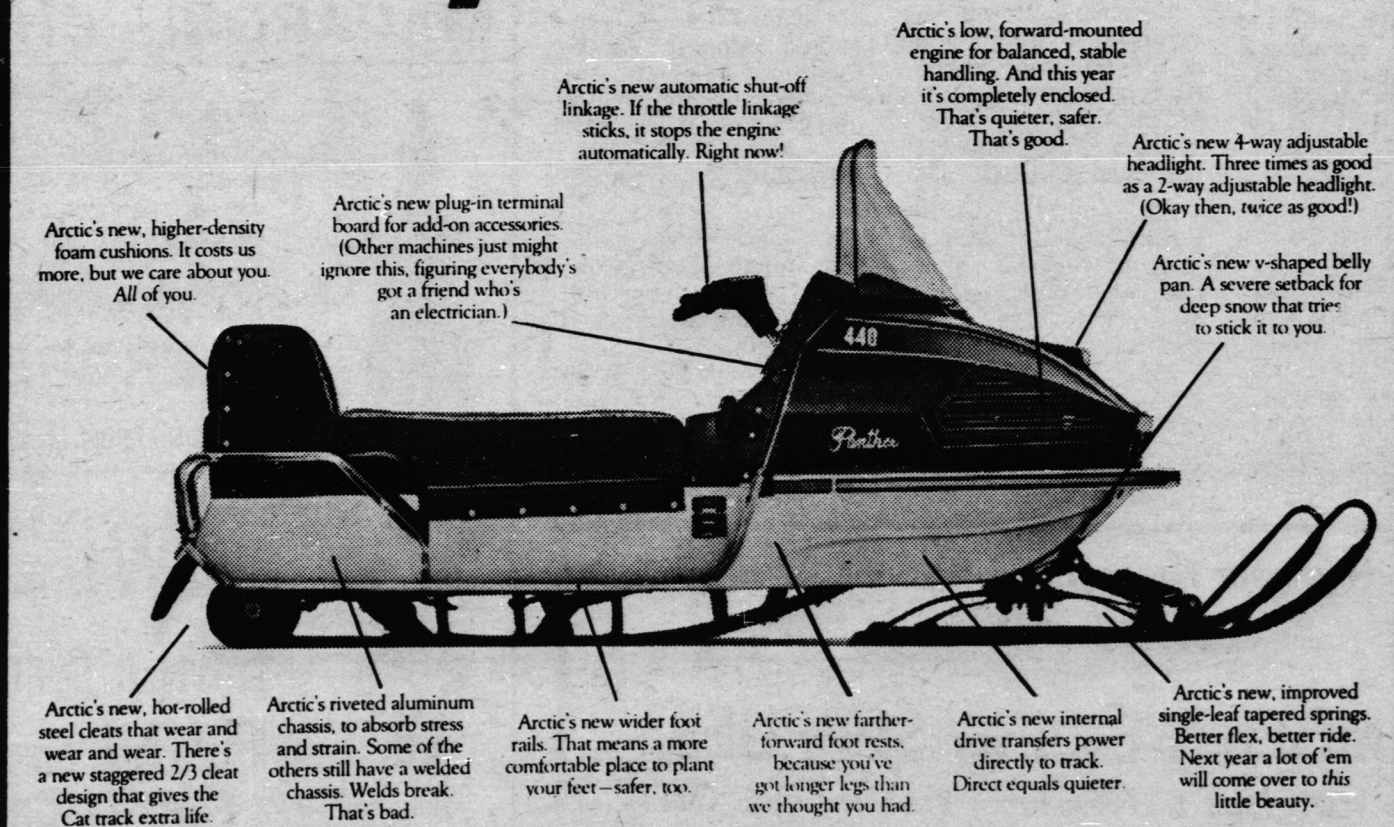
at about 330, the growth is slow during summer but this winter will probably see more activity than ever before.
