



Have you claimed your credit?

Even if you don't pay income taxes you may benefit from the Ontario Government's new Property Tax Credit Plan, but you must apply by filling in a 1972 Income Tax Return.

You'll find a special mauve claim form just for that purpose in the 1972 income tax kit. An explanation of the plan is right on the form The new Property Tax Credit Plan provides greater benefits for

more—the elderly, roomers, boarders, and low income families. If you paid property taxes or rent last year, you may be eligible. Pick up a tax return kit at any post office, if you haven't already got one. And send in both the tax return and the mauve claim form. But do it quickly—remember returns and claims are to be

filed by April 30th. Your federal District Taxation Office will be glad to answer any questions you might have.
