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OPP Report

Officers of the Cayuga Detachment investigated a total of twelve motor vehicle collisions during the period March 24th to March 31st, 1973. On March 26th, 1973 a parked car was hit in Fisherville and an unknown vehicle left the scene. The vehicle will be either white or cream and will have red paint on it from where the vehicle struck.

Also during this period nine persons were charged under the Liquor Control Act, two persons were charged with Impaired Driving and one person arrested for another police department. Investigations were made regarding one Break, Enter and Theft from a cottage and the theft of a motor vehicle which was recovered. Twenty-one investigations were also made as a result of calls received of a various nature.

On March 27th, 1973 at approximately 1:00

p.m. an explosion occurred at the Electric Reduction Company of Canada at Port Maitland while a tank truck was unloading a quantity of spent sulphuric acid into a storage tank. Seven hundred tons on spent sulphuric acid was spilled. The Ministry of the Environment, Department of Labour and Hazardous Chemical Spill Emergency were notified and operations were started immediately to contain and neutralize the sulphuric acid. Three persons were injured in the incident and were taken to Hamilton General Hospital. Karl Acker, R. R. 6, Dunnville and James Anderson, 312 Alder Street, Dunnville both employees of the Electric Reduction Company of Canada and Harry Bertram Cotes, employee of Provincial Tank Lines are being treated at the hospital for burns.

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Have you claimed your credit?

Even if you don't pay income taxes you may benefit from the Ontario Government's new Property Tax Credit Plan, but you must apply by filling in a 1972 Income Tax Return.

You'll find a special mauve claim form just for that purpose in the 1972 income tax kit. An explanation of the plan is right on the form.

The new Property Tax Credit Plan provides greater benefits for more - the elderly, roomers, boarders, and low income families.

If you paid property taxes or rent last year, you may be eligible.

Pick up a tax return kit at any post office, if you haven't already got one. And send in both the tax return and the mauve claim form. But do it quickly - remember returns and claims are to be filed by April 30th.

Your federal District Taxation Office will be glad to answer any questions you might have.
