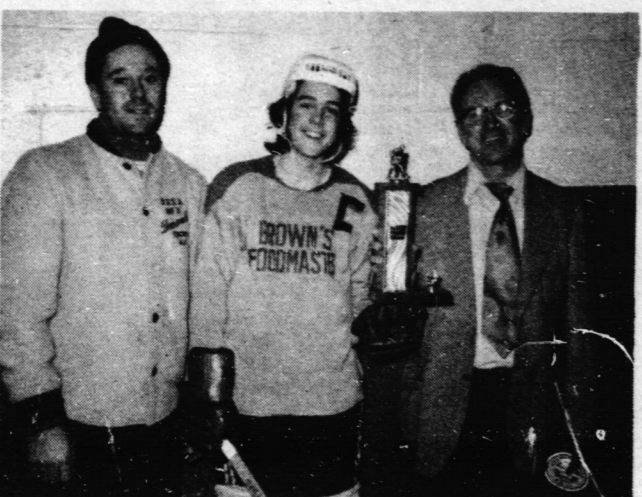

Tweedle Gives Flyers Wings

Dick Tweedle brought the Flyers back from the brink of playoff elimination with two straight victories after the home club had lost the first two games of the series to Mitchell. The first game was played in Mitchell last Tuesday and the Mitchell Hawks skated off with a 6-3 win. When the teams returned home Friday night they again lost 7-3 and it looked like it was all over for this year. Yours truly had written the Flyers off and went as far as to say they would not win one game of the semi-final series. Friday night had to be the low spot of the entire year for the Hagersville crew for they played lousy hockey and shouldn't have been in the same arena with the Hawks.

The Flyers and Tweedle went back to Mitchell on Saturday night and came away with a 5-4 win. Glen Hewson fired in two quick goals before the period was three minutes old. Terry Fryett set up the first one and Ross McKeen and Jim Lam were in on the last one. Tweedle was beaten on only one of the 13 shots fired at him in

this period and this seemed to give the boys the lift they needed. The Hawks scored three in the second period, while Anthony Yacobino got one back for Hagersville.

In the last period, McKeen tied the score with an unassisted goal before Jim Nagel got the winner with just 40 seconds left in the game. In this period as in the first, Tweedle was sharp and stopped all 12 shots fired his way. Playing at home before 1,100 fans on Monday night, the Flyers had wings and flew all over the Hawks to come away with a 5-1 win. Tweedle was beaten for the first goal of the game at the 12 minute mark of the first period, but this was the last goal to get by him for the night. Yacobino and Paul Phibbs set up Bill Nagel for the first Hagersville goal two minutes later and the Flyers were on their way.

Hewson was sitting out a slashing penalty when Jim Nagel stole the puck from Jim Avery behind the net and brought it out in front and banged it in for the winning goal, with just 34 seconds left in the period.

Before the second period was a minute old, Jim Nagel poked the puck off the stick of the Mitchell defenceman and it went right in the net for a 3-1 lead. The Hawks missed a chance to close the gap when they hit the post while having a man advantage. McKeen did the same thing for the Flyers as he rattled a puck off the post from the point.

John Kineaid was a faceoff in the Mitchell end and slapped it at the net. He picked up his own rebound and made the score 4-1 as the period ended. This period was all the Flyers as they outshot the Hawks 14-3.

Terry Fryett scored the last goal of the game 21 seconds after the last period started with Hewson and Bill Nagel getting assists.

Coach Kenny Morrison seemed quite happy after the game and now feels the boys could win the series in 7 games. Ken said the boys had a real let down after the St. George set, but now it looks like they are back in their old form. What a difference a couple of days make. We had the Flyers wrote off as a lost cause, but by the time you read this they could be on their way to the finals. It will take a complete team effort and some top notch goal tending, but maybe.
