Soybean Night is Wednesday, April 11. A top notch program on production of soybeans will get underway at 8:00 p.m. in Canboro Community Hall. Don Campbell, chairman of the Haldimand Soil and Crop Improvement Association's Soybean Committee will preside.

Arrangements have been made to have Don Littlejohns from Ridgeway College of Agricultural Technology outline the major concerns in soybean production. A panel of soybean growers will present farmers experience with the crop. Panelists will be Bill Elder, Canfield, Diethard Schuender, Wellandport, Ron Snyder, Niagara Falls and Awrey Martin, Binbrook. Everyone is welcome. Members of Soil and Crop Improvement Association in Wentworth, North and South Niagara have been invited to attend.

The rain recording project started last year by members of Haldimand Soil and Crop Improvement Association, will be continued and enlarged in 1973. Another 15 to 20 co-operators would be welcome. Rain gauges calibrated to measure rainfall to a second decimal point are available at nominal costs to association members who would like to take part.
