## EDITORIAL COMMENT

### Sobering Idea

"Thou shalt not drink when driving" is a commandment geared for our auto dependent society.

Television commercials caution drinking drivers against the consequences, concerned organizations preach their "no driving for drinkers" message and newspapers relate the sad story of injuries and deaths occurring when tipplers disobey this golden rule.

Despite the warnings, accidents, fines and breathalyzer tests, impaired drivers continue to jump behind the wheel of a car and attempt to steer their way home.

Obviously, they aren't listening, but why? Are changes which read like the following in local newspapers not a strong enough deterrent?

"Two men were fined \$150 each or 14 days and lost their licences for three months for impaired driving."

Share, a newsletter published by CIAG (co-operators insurance association of Guelph) printed in a recent issue a list of penalties handed out to drunken drivers in other countries.

"In Australia, the names of the drivers are sent to the local newspapers and are printed under the heading 'He's drunk and in jail.'"

In Malaysia, the drunk is jailed, if he's married, his wife goes too.

In Turkey, drunk drivers are taken 20 miles by police and forced to walk back under escort.

In South Africa, the driver is given a 10 year prison sentence, a fine of \$2,800, or both.

In San Salvador, drunk drivers are executed by firing squads."

Maybe we should get a little tougher. Eliminating the driver completely, as mentioned in the article, is a bit drastic, but perhaps a 20 mile walk or some humiliating publicity would keep those drunks off the road long enough to sober up.

### Keeping Lent

We are now in the season of Lent. This season is not so much observed today and perhaps it is as well, for there was always a touch of hypocrisy about it. However, the things that Lent stands for are too valuable to be thrown out. The Church has, actually, given us a lead in this matter. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and one of the Scripture readings for this day is the 58th Chapter of the book of the prophet Isaiah. You might well ask what has the old prophet to say about Lent which is a purely Christian observance? Of course he did not know anything about it, but what he does is to describe the kind of Fast that will please God. As Lent is a period of Fasting, Isaiah's words apply to Lent and the right way to keep it.

The chapter opens with a strong condemnation of the hypocrisy of the people who profess to keep the fast and make a great outward show, but who have no intention of keeping it in their own lives. He says (v. 6) "Is not this the fast that I (God) have chosen?" Then he goes on to itemize how they should keep the fast. As I have no room to discuss each verse minutely, all I can do is to give a general idea. If you want to check up on me, you can read it for yourself, especially verses 6-11.

He begins by making a plea for justice. "To loose the fetters of injustice" (New English Bible). He then goes on to tell them to share their food with the hungry, to take the homeless poor into their own homes and to clothe those who are insufficiently clothed. He then urges them to do their duty to their own kinfolk. He goes on to condemn those who pervert justice and make false charges.

It is wonderful that this old prophet, who lived so many centuries ago, should be able to outline for us exactly the things we should do to keep a proper Lent.

Going without some favourite food or amusement is one way of keeping Lent, but it is rather a negative way. It would be far better to do what the old prophet suggests, namely that we take a positive way and DO something. Lent is nearly over, but perhaps there is something we can do, somebody we can help and thus make it a positive Lent as Isaiah tells us to do. Some people tell us that the Christian religion is old-fashioned, but if they would dig a little deeper they would find that it is actually quite modern -- as Isaiah 58 shows us.

West End Sewers

A lot of people in the west end of Hagersville have been concerned over how they are going to get water and sewage services from the street to their house.

Ken Skinner and Don Popp explained to Hagersville council Monday night what they are doing to alleviate the worry.

Mr. Popp said they will be drilling and blasting private line routes for west end residents at \$12 a foot. It is left up to the individual to do the digging out, he said.

They have already received approximately 25-30 signatures from people signing releases saying that if any damage is done by the two men, the residents will look after it.

If damage is done to another person's property, the two men are liable. "That's law," Mr. Popp said.

Mr. Skinner said they are drilling and blasting '8' so that they get the high spots. If they miss some rock, they'll come back, he added.

And the roadways made of only clay

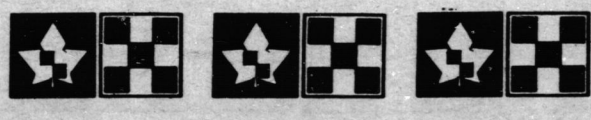
I like to walk through bush green meadows
