Federation Facts

Livestock markets and market trends will need to be watched very closely during this period of food price controversy.

Meat processors seem to be keeping their stocks low as a result of some consumer unrest and the possibility of some resistance to present retail prices.

Beef and pork producers in particular should not panic when there is a change in price, and send to market stock that is not yet finished and thereby oversupply the market.

Rising costs are everyone's concern, and to what degree they are rising can be learned from Statistics Canada. In measuring increase, 1961 prices equal 100 index, and recordings over 100 indicate the amount of increase from 1961 to the end of 1972. The following are some figures taken from Statistics Canada. Farm expenses index 144, farm income index 133. Cost of living index 143, the food portion of the cost of living index 145, Average wages index 195.

Prices are rising in every area according to Statistics Canada, but not at an even pace.
