Governments need more women with "seeing eye and biting tongue" to promote the good things Canada has to offer, Ada Pritchard told 210 women last Wednesday in Kohler. Speaking at the annual Daffodil Luncheon,

sponsored by the women's committee of the Haldimand Federation of Agriculture, the retired MLA urged women to take an active part in public life.

I'm not saying women are better than men, but they do have a different point of view and, politics "does take someone who can be very vocal."

Mrs. Pritchard spoke with the "liberated woman's" voice of experience and responsibility linked closely with the achievement of becoming the first woman ever to be elected to the government side of

the house in Ontario. She says she just became involved in politics because she's a "very ornery woman who got annoyed with the way things were done."
