**Schedule
Released For
SCBA League**

The Southern Counties Baseball Association Intermediate League will open on Sun., May 20th when all four teams will be in action. Simcoe will be in Hagersville for a game with the Juniors and St. Thomas will travel to Walsingham when the 24-game schedule gets underway on the holiday weekend.

Each team will play doubleheaders to complete the schedule by August 5.

Several amendments were made to improve conditions in the league. All players, coaches, and managers must be in full uniform and will not be allowed on the field improperly dressed once the game has started.

The teams agreed to substitute a runner for the catcher on base with two out. The runner will be the last player out, unless he is the pitcher, in which case he will be the previous player in the line-up.

Starting pitchers, for the first inning only, and relief pitchers will be allowed eight pitches to be completed in one minute. In all other innings, the pitcher will be allowed five pitches.

The league adopted a mercy rule which terminates a game if a team is ahead by 10 runs or more after seven innings of play.

The all-star game this season will see a team of players from the four teams playing against a team from the Senior Intercounty Baseball Association in either Simcoe or St. Thomas.

Simcoe offered to host the league's wind-up banquet this season.
