School Rental Policies

The policy of the Haldimand County Board of Education is to make school facilities available to the public to the fullest possible extent. This policy is subject to the interests of the educational programme which will take precedence.

For the purpose of policy and regulations regarding school rentals and use of school facilities:

Applications for the use of facilities shall be made in writing on forms supplied by the Board.

Applications should be received at least 3 weeks in advance of the desired date at the

Board of Education offices.

The Board reserves the right to cancel any permit. When such cancellation is made any deposit will be refunded in full and written notification will be made to the applicant to the address shown on the application.

Applicants will be notified in writing of the approval or disapproval of their applications.

When application is approved copies are forwarded to the Principal and the Custodian of the school.

Some of the regulations governing the rental of school facilities include:

No intoxicating beverages will be permitted on the premises except where a special occasion permit has been procured.

Smoking is prohibited except in designated areas.

The rentee is solely responsible for the enforcement of all fire regulations and must ensure that obstructions are not placed in corridors or in front of fire exits.

Any tax shall be the responsibility of the rentee.

No person shall be allowed in any part of the building other than the area contracted in this agreement.

The Board accepts no responsibility for personal injury or damage or for loss or theft of any articles, of the rentee or persons attending its function.

Any damage arising from the use of school premises by the rentee will be the responsibility of said rentee.

Additional charges may be incurred by failing to vacate premises at agreed times.

Signs or decorations may be attached to walls or elsewhere without prior arrangement with the school.

All permits will be issued at the discretion of the Board.

The applicant acknowledges and assumes full responsibility for proper supervision of any activity they conduct. The school facilities are under the immediate control and supervision of the Board representative present. The applicant agrees to accept such direction as may be requested by the Board representative present.

Presiding over the meeting, which was attended by a small percentage of members, was President, Margaret Chrysler. It was felt the small turn-out

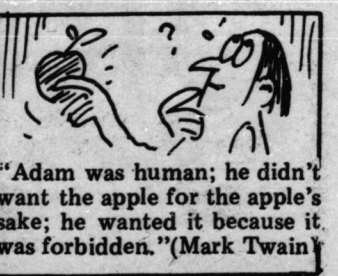
was decidedly due to the Easter week-end holiday, with many being away travelling.
