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decision they have made by the end of July. Re: The "Union Gas" application to remove certain gas lines considered as non productive in Haldimand County.

At the meeting, Mr. Nicklin displayed four coloured maps from the Ontario Department of Municipal Affairs. He explained to the citizens such items of interest as the proposed satellite city, the urban and industrial area, including the buffer zone of air pollution, the proposed site for water and sewage treatment plants, green belts and also, the resort recreation centres and parkway lay-out. In his discussion of the final map covering transportation and service corridors in and through the Nanticoke Complex, Mr. Nicklin spoke of the proposed possibility of a railway yard, regionalized airport and the location of the main service corridor into the Nanticoke area. The Association was reminded that the Port Facilities Study had not yet been completed for release to the membership but the Lake Shore Study had been completed and has been in the final typing stage during the last eight weeks. He also said he believed that all the facts and reasons for the pressure to discontinue gas had not been presented because the total plan for this area still has a few missing links.

Mrs. Margaret Finlayson received an ovation for the job she did during 1972-3 as Association secretary. The President thanked Herb Cave for a job well done as auditor for the membership. The two auditors appointed to act on behalf of the Association for the new year are Herb Cave of R. R. 2 Nanticoke and Tony Zlater of Stoney Creek, who is a non resident property owner in Walpole. County councillors made it quite clear the Haldimand County boundary line should remain "steadfast and non-negotiable."

"If they (Norfolk) accept the whole County of Haldimand, regional government will proceed. If not, then we'll go back to the bargaining table," Mr. Miller said.

Earlier in the meeting, County councillors unanimously approved a motion objecting to a Haldimand - Norfolk Study recommendation that Caledonia and the northern parts of Seneca and Oneida townships be severed from Haldimand and tied with the Hamilton - Wentworth region.

All three municipalities also presented resolutions stating their desire to remain with rural Haldimand. A copy of the county's motion will be sent to John White, minister of Treasury, Economics and Intergovernmental Affairs. Council also stressed

## Youth Killed In Single-Car Crash

A single-car crash Saturday night on the Cocksbutt Road, two miles south of Renton, claimed the life of Brian Wayne McCutcheon, 16, of R. R. 3 Simcoe.

He was pronounced dead on arrival at Norfolk General Hospital by coroner Dr. Keith McIntosh of Simcoe.

McCutcheon and David Spates, 16, of Petawawa, had been hitch hiking along the Cocksbutt Road about a mile from the scene of the crash. The two were picked up by Donald Edward Ryerse, 24, of 206 Pansy Ave., Port Dover. Police said the car left the road, went down a steep bank and into a field.

Spates was treated for minor injuries and released. Ryerse is in satisfactory condition with

## O.P.P. Report

During this period oficers of the Cayuga Detachment investigated 77 occurrences of various nature including 15 Criminal Code investigations, seven Liquor Control Act investigations resulting in seven persons being charged.

## On The Farm Front

Oats, especially Rodney, have a tendency to show reddish or yellow leaves in some seasons. This is especially true under early wetgrowing conditions or areas low in nitrogen. In Haldimand this spring, it appears that the oats are suffering from "blast" according to Prof. I. R. Evans. This is a condition that occurs 6-8 weeks after sowing during periods of unusually hot dry weather.

"Blasted" oats either fail to head or a large number of kernels will appear whitish and empty on those oats that have headed. There is no recommended control for this condition though higher nitrogen levels in the soil will help.

Oats sown after mid-May, especially under the present hot, dry conditions are increasingly susceptible to "blast."
