



The Ontario Energy Board has approved the discontinuance of gas services to 260 rural customers in Walpole, North Cayuga, South Cayuga, Dunn and Rainham Townships effective September 30,

1973. Union Gas Limited applied for the discontinuance in 1972. The hearing opened on Nov-ember 6, 1972 and con-cluded May 15, 1973. The grant of discon-

tinuance does not apply to Ken Bousfield and Mr. J. Genery who are to be supplied from an alternate source.

The Order will be conditional on Union providing change-over assistance as outlined by the Board.


