A slight error appeared in the story of "Jarvis Post Office" published last week. It was used as a postoffice until Mr. Stanley Burditt built the present office where Mr. Scarr is postmaster.

Small Farm Development Program

FARM LISTING SERVICE

Under the SMALL FARM DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM the Farm Credit Corporation maintains a listing service at its local offices.

If you are the owner of a small farm which you wish to sell for not more than \$20,000 you should visit the local F.C.C. office before completing the sale arrangements to list your farm and inquire about the possibility of a grant under the Program.

If you have just sold your farm you should immediately check with F.C.C. as to whether a grant is available.

The listings will be available to any interested purchasers. If you are looking for land to expand your present farm you should check to see if any of the land listed will meet your needs. You may qualify for special credit to buy it.

Bits 'n Pieces

TAX EXEMPT?

The Haldimand Board of Education followed the action of two other county boards and resolved that all functions of the school board should be exempt from sales tax since education is financed by the province and the ministry of education has placed a ceiling on the board.

A copy of the resolution will be sent to James Allen, MPP, the minister of education and the two other boards who suggested the resolution.

At present, maintenance supplies, washroom supplies and building materials for construction are subject to the tax.

WALPOLE SOUTH RESTORATION

At last week's Board of Education meeting, the Property Committee reported that the restoration of the General Purpose Room and Auxiliary areas of Walpole South Elementary School are well underway. The contract for this work has been let to J & H Construction Company and the last estimate of costs for this work is \$59,777.49.

PARKVIEW PROGRESS

At last week's Board of Education meeting, the property committee reported that construction of the school's new addition is practically completed. The architect predicts the first list of deficiencies will be drawn up by August 15 and the addition will be open for school purposes on Sept. 4.

PUTTING GREEN

The physical Education Departments at the secondary schools have been working on programs which will extend the interest of the student into recreation for adult life, the Management Committee of the Board of Education reported at their July 31st meeting.

The Hagersville Secondary School would like to add a "putting green" to its facilities in order to teach interested students some fundamentals in golfing. As this would entail a considerable expense, the committee took the matter under advisement and is asking the Administration to investigate the costs and program further.

SATELLITE CITY

John White, minister of Treasury, Economics and Intergovernmental Affairs, said at a meeting in Port Dover Friday that he does not see site selection for a satellite city in Haldimand-Norfolk as "one of the more urgent decisions."

And, there won't be any decision made before October 31st - date that options taken on land in the Walpole-Townsend area by private developers runs out.

Mr. White also said he understands from provincial experts that the cost of servicing a Woodhouse site, recommended by the Haldimand-Norfolk Study report on land use for the city, is cheaper than the Jarvis area selected by the consortium.

PAY 100%

John White, minister of Treasury, Economics and Intergovernmental Affairs says the province will pay 100% of the extra cost for regional changeover.

WHAT ABOUT BRANT?

John White, minister of Treasury, Economics and Intergovernmental Affairs urged Haldimand and Norfolk counties not to decide on the question of a tri-county system - Brant, Haldimand and Norfolk - until Commissioner Smith makes his report around mid-September.

However, at a press conference held after the meeting with the Haldimand-Norfolk Joint Study Committee, Mr. White said a tri-county region would suit him.

"My intuition tells me it would be a pretty good arrangement," he said. But, if Haldimand and Norfolk don't want it, they'll go ahead with the two county region. Brant could also be added at a later date, he said.

Wise, Unwise And Otherwise

THE TRANSFIGURATION

Monday, August 6th, was the little observed Festival of the Transfiguration, which celebrates an important event in our Lord's earthly life.

One day Jesus took His three leading Apostles, Peter, James and John, up into the hills to pray. When they got there they saw a change come over Him. "The appearance of His face changed and His clothes became a dazzling white" (St. Luke 9 N.E.B.). Then the Apostles saw two men talking to Him and somehow they knew that these two men were Moses and Elijah, who had been dead for centuries. Peter was so excited that he suggested building three huts -- for Jesus and the other two. As he spoke, a "bright cloud" enveloped them and a voice came from within the cloud saying "This is my beloved Son, hear ye Him."

That is the story. It is very short, but full of significance. In the first place, Jesus appears as being "transfigured" or changed, with a strange unearthly light. It is the only occasion when He let His Divine glory shine through His human body. The story concludes with the Voice of God coming from a cloud of glory.

Then there is the appearance of Moses and Elijah which is remarkable for its own sake, but even more so for what they represent. A favorite cry of the Jews was "To the Law and the Prophets." In these two men we have the Law and the Prophets visualized in person; Moses the giver of the Law and Elijah the great Prophet. Then comes the Voice "This is my beloved Son... Hear ye Him." The Law and the Prophets are not the supreme guides they once were. The Son has come and we must obey Him.

In St. Matthew 16, just before the account of the Transfiguration, Jesus spoke of the Kingdom and said that there were some standing there who would not die "before they have seen the Son of Man coming in His kingdom." Some commentators think that Jesus was then referring to His appearance in glory at the Transfiguration.

This has been called the Fourth Temptation because Jesus foresaw the crucifixion and could have gone straight from the hill top to Heaven, but He resisted and went to the Cross to be our Saviour. The God of Glory is also the God of Love. Jesus came, not only to heal and teach, but also to die for our sins on the cross.
