Kett Has Two Homers

Paul Kett, who played all of his ball for Hagersville, turned on the visiting Hagersville team and poked two towering homers over the trees in Simcoe to propel the Simcoe Giants to a 17-1 win over the Hagersville Blues.

In all, Simcoe pounded Hagersville Blues, pitching for 14 hits. Harold Taylor started for the Blues, but gave way to Tony Yacobino in the 3rd after Kett's second homerun. Simcoe scored in every inning but the 4th, as the game was called in the top of the 7th on account of the new mercy rule that is in effect this year. This was the 9th win of the year for Simcoe against one defeat and that came at the hand of the Blues. This must have been some type of revenge for coach Doug

MacDonald of the Giants.

Jim Bruder was in playoff form as he faced only three men over the limit in the seven innings, with Terry Dosser getting two hits for Hagersville and Yacobino getting the other.

Dosser was doubled off first to cut down one runner, with Glen Hewson drawing the only base on balls that Bruder gave up for the 24th man he faced in the game. The base on balls to Hewson proved costly as he scored all the way from first on Yacobino's double. Bruder fanned five and walked only one while Taylor and Yacobino walked two and struck out four. 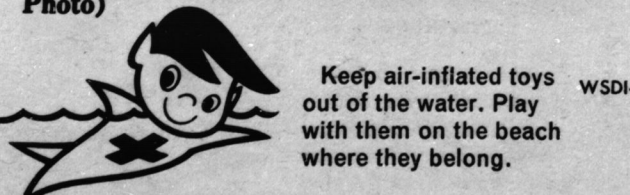
thirds while striking out three and allowing just one hit and four runs.

Fehrman Wins Most Valuable Player Award

Hub Fehrman, pitching the best ball he has all season, gave Jarvis Harvesters the consolation trophy in the fast-ball tournament played in Binbrook last week.

Fehrman pitched two games and won them both by scores of 3-1 and 1-0.

In the first game Hub pitched a three hitter against the Port Dover Lakers and struck out seven while walking none. One of the three hits was a long home run by Glen Rockafeller to account for the lone run for the Lakers. Powell and Evey were the only other Lakers to get a hit.

Dennis Craddock led off the first inning for the Harvesters with a single and moved to second when Paul Kett beat out a slow grounder to third. Bill Prince flned with both runners

moving up after the catch. Ted Phibbs hit a ground ball to short and the throw home was too late to get the speedy Craddock. A single by Fehrman and a sacrifice by Wylie, followed by a single by Bryan Smith scored one run before a single by Craddock plated a second run in the second inning for a 3-0 lead. Fehrman picked up another single as did Wylie with Smith adding a triple for the rest of the Jarvis hits, but the Harvesters failed to score any more runs. Wylie played a steady game at first base and handled eight chances without an error.

The final game was a real thriller as Hub came right back with a five hit, 1-0 shutout over Binbrook. Jerry Smith and Gord Richardson had two hits apiece for Binbrook, with Dave

Moore adding the 5th. Fehrman allowed only one runner as far as second base and that was in the last inning. Fehrman walked only one batter and struck out four in going the distance for the second straight game. Dennis Craddock played a great game in left field, registering eight putouts.

The Harvesters scored the winning run in the last inning as Smith led off the inning with his second hit of the game. Bruce Biggar popped to first on an attempted bunt, but Craddock followed with a single. Smith scored when the right fielder bobbled the ball and Craddock went to second. Makara Wins Third Race

Jerry Makara of Westland, Michigan, won his third feature race of the season at Cayuga International Speedway when he flashed across the finish line in the Bill Beatty 1969 Chevelle, Friday night.

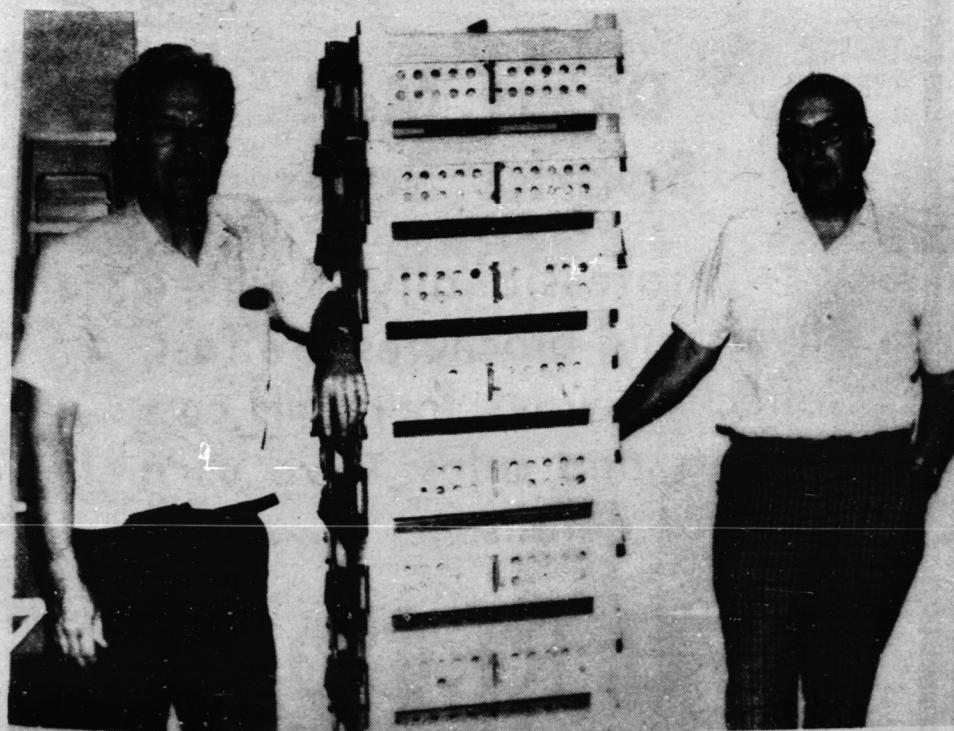
of sterness in his later portraits was due to this device.
