



Louis S. St. Laurent

Prime Minister Trudeau paid tribute to former Prime Minister Louis S. St. Laurent, who died this week in Quebec City at the age of 91 -- "He entered public life primarily to foster Canadian harmony. His contribution to the better understanding of Canada by Canadians was immense and everywhere in this country he became the symbol of tolerance and unity."

Commonwealth Heads of Government will meet in Ottawa, August 2-10 -- the first time this meeting will be held in Canada and only the third time it has taken place outside Great Britain, since the meetings originated in 1944.

The meeting will be the largest international gathering ever held in Canada in terms of numbers of delegations. Prime Minister Trudeau will act as Chairman to the Conference and Queen Elizabeth will meet with Heads of Government during her second visit to Canada.

Defence Tour National Defence Minister, James Richardson will undertake a 24-day -- Aug. 5-29 -- tour of defence establishments and will

meet with defence ministers in five Commonwealth Countries -- Australia, New Zealand, Malaysia, India and Tanzania.

This will be the first time a Canadian defence minister has visited any of these countries.

Nuclear Tests The House of Commons unanimously supported a resolution deploring France's nuclear bomb explosions in the Pacific Ocean and urged "in the name of humanity" cancellation of any further tests.

More Canadians Consumer and Corporate Affairs Minister Herb Gray introduced in the House of Commons the federal government's proposed new Canada Business Corporations Act which would require all federally chartered companies to have a majority of resident Canadians as directors.

The legislation is intended to give Canadians greater participation in the economic life of this country.

## Eddie Feigner Is On His Way Again..... To Jarvis

He's been travelling coast to coast for 28 years. One of these nights, he'll feel his age, his great arm will tire and he'll say he's had enough.

Then one will regret not seeing Eddie Feigner when he was passing through.

He is one of a kind, a magic name of his sport. Softball's Joe DiMaggio. Joe Namath. Arnold Palmer. Pancho Gonzales.

He comes to Jarvis September 3, 1973 to pitch for his King and His Court four-man team against the full sized Jarvis Harvesters. He'll talk it up, ham it up, show a half-hundred different pitches and strike out the side whenever it gets too monotonous.

That's been the format ever since Eddie Feigner blew out of hometown Walla Walla, Washington with his four-man team in 1946 to establish himself as the best-known man in the game.

He's pitched practically every major and minor league park in the country, every good-sized city, scores of dot-on-the-map towns where he dropped in to break up a trip.

He's been travelling with this club since he was born 22 years ago in Avon Park, Fla., the father said. "I began using him an inning or two, six years ago. Now, he is a real good one, and excellent at fielding and hitting."

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## United Church Minister Inducted

On Wednesday evening Aug. 1, the Rev. Mark Reeves of Port Perry was inducted into the pastoral charge of the United Church of Canada. A good attendance from both churches marked the occasion, with Mrs. Harry Lambert, Chairman of the Erie Presbytery in charge of the service.

She opened with the call to worship -- the hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name." Responsive reading and called upon Ralph Gowan for scripture reading, followed by the sermon delivered by the Rev. V.S. Miner.

Rev. Miner's Call to the Minister The new minister is a Christian minister, a preacher of the Christian Gospel, and has a revelation from God of what God can do for his people and what his people must do, to deliver. A conscientious minister is responsible to God, so does not preach just to please people -- is never far away from living and demonstrating the saving grace of Jesus Christ. He must keep abreast of times to express Christian truth in terms his congregation can understand and must be able to install a sense of responsibility in his people so they can be ready to face the problems of the day.

The minister does not stand alone. The congregation has received the Word of God the same as the minister and are a holy priesthood. Rev. Miner urged the congregation to strengthen worship by being early for worship to communicate with God and form thoughts.

A congregation can encourage a minister by letting him know what they are interested in, helping him in his teaching, letting him know when he has helped. They can help his work as a pastor by a friendly interest in people, and giving him information about newcomers, the sick and the lonely. They are to see themselves as part of the Church as a whole and as part of the Body of Christ. He closed with a short

prayer for the minister and his congregation. Following the address by Rev. Miner and the Anthem, Mrs. Lambert presided for the commitment by the congregation and minister the responses coming reverently, clear and firm. Mrs. Lambert led in prayer of confession and intercession for the minister and congregation, followed by the Lords Prayer. The new minister, the Rev. Mark Reeves pronounced the benediction.

A time of fellowship was held in the Christian Education Centre. After a bountiful lunch served by the ladies of Jarvis and Garnet, Norman Walpole, Chairman of U.C. Pastoral Relations Committee, and Gordon Roulston, Garnet Clerk of Session and Ralph Gowan, acting for Mac Reid Wesley Clerk of Session, introduced the new incumbent to the persons assembled -- including the ministers of other churches in the town.
