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SERVICES

14,500 acres of land in Walpole and Townsend townships, optioned for residential development, "enjoy a special advantage from the servicing viewpoint," a consortium of developers say.

The group, which is seeking approval from the provincial government to have a new city built here instead of a site proposed for Woodhouse township, says their area lies on or immediately adjacent to the planned regional truck facilities. "Water supply to the Townsend site would thus expediate the regional distribution to inland communities, by bringing it approximately five miles further along the route, with a large user on site," they maintain. In addition, they say the Townsend site is a logical distribution point for the surrounding communities of Hagersville, Waterford, Jarvis and Cayuga.

EXPENSIVE LAND

According to an application sent into John White, minister of Treasury, Economics and Intergovernmental Affairs by a consortium of developers, "a study of land prices in June and July of this year indicates that land adjacent to Simcoe and Port Dover is selling in the range of \$12,500 and \$10,000 per acre respectively." The consortium has optioned 14,500 acres in the Townsend-Walpole area and would like to see the government choose this site for the proposed new city, rather than the Port Dover-Simcoe area.

CLERKS CAN DO IT

At Hagersville's council meeting Monday night, Councillor Dominic Vanni expressed doubts whether regional government could be implemented in time for Jan. 1, 1974.

But, Reeve John Kincaid said Hagersville's clerk Art Roth feels he can do it by that time. "I'm sure the others can too," Mr. Kincaid said.

He added that the province is going to help the clerks and provide additional staff. Deputy-reeve Norm Crawford told members he made a motion at a meeting of the Haldimand-Norfolk Joint Study Committee that the counties ask for an extension date till April in case they were unable to meet the January target date. But, it was turned down.

WHITE ELEPHANT

Norm Crawford, deputy-reeve of Hagersville said at Monday night's council meeting that he's heard talk that there may be another "white elephant" coming into the area, other than Stelco and Texaco.

ENHANCE PROJECT

Neil Dunn said at Thursday night's meeting of the Haldimand-Norfolk Joint Study Committee that the implementation of regional government by Jan. 1, 1974 would "enhance" the Haldimand-Norfolk Study project's work.

WHAT ABOUT CLERKS?

One member of the Haldimand-Norfolk Joint Study Committee asked what would happen to all the extra clerks and office staff once regional government is implemented.

Using the proposed Nanticoke region as an example, he pointed out that there are presently six municipalities there with six clerks and office staff. What happens to them?

A representative from the ministry of treasury, economics and intergovernmental affairs at the meeting in Simcoe said all clerks and municipal staff are guaranteed a job and their salary for a year.

After that, municipalities are not obliged to lay off staff, he said. There will be a lot of work. He suggested there may be a clerk, deputy-clerk, treasurer and deputy-treasurer working in a single region.

Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Steel celebrated their Diamond Wedding Anniversary today. Aug. 31, 1933

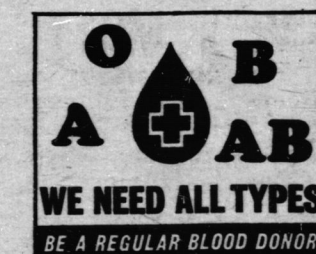
