**Juveniles End

A three run 6th inning carried the Hagersville Juveniles to a 6-4 win over Caledonia in the last regular game of the season.

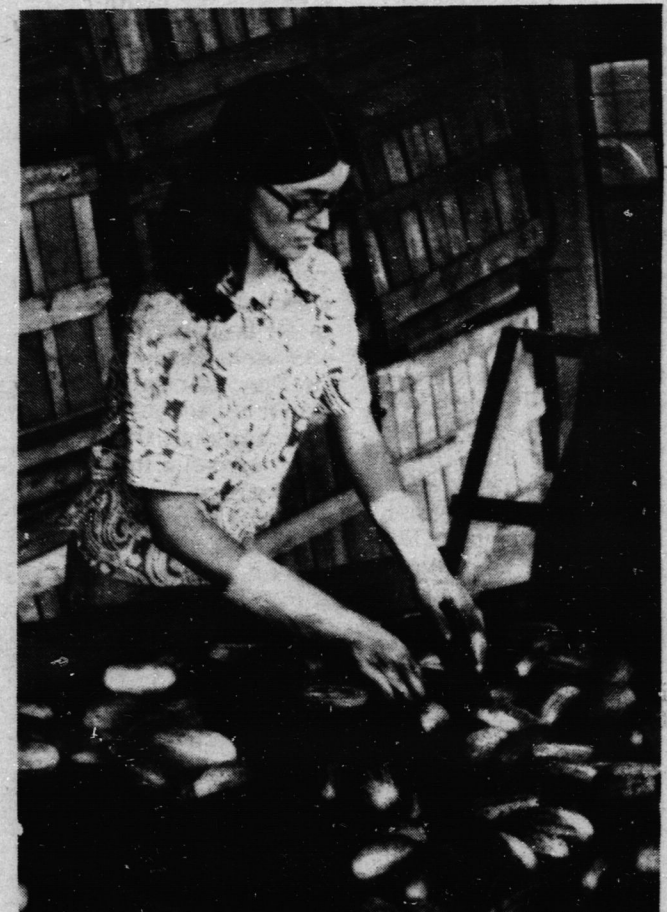
