

Haldimand Says No To Early Marriage With Norfolk

Norfolk County Council is prepared to implement regional government by the first of the new year, but Haldimand isn't.

At separate meetings held in Simcoe and Cayuga on Friday, Norfolk voted 23-14 in favor of Jan. 1, 1974, while Haldimand County Council voted 22-8 in favor of a July 1, 1974 implementation date.

John White, minister of Treasury, Economics and Intergovernmental Affairs urged the two counties to work towards January 1st at a meeting in Port Dover on August 3rd. The following week, on August

9th, the Haldimand-Norfolk Joint Study Committee passed a resolution recommending county councils go for Jan. 1st.

However, Haldimand feels 135 days does not give the counties enough time to iron out the wrinkles which will be created in the change-over. Some councillors felt boundaries for municipalities and wards could not be determined within the next three weeks in time for fall elections. Others wanted more time to study Nigel Richardson's recommendations in the Haldimand-Norfolk Study, more

time to ease the burden they feel will be placed on municipality clerks and more time to look after the transfer of local boards, assets and liabilities.

JULY 1st
Council rejected the January 1st date and approved a July 1st motion made by Ken Best, reeve of Cayuga, and seconded by Norm Crawford, deputy reeve of Hagersville.

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White Suggests Compromise

A compromise target date for the establishment of regional government for Haldimand and Norfolk counties was suggested Monday in Toronto by John White, minister of Treasury, Economics and Intergovernmental Affairs.

Twelve New Homes Planned For Jarvis

Twelve new homes will be built in Jarvis as soon as land designated for townhouses is rezoned, Leo P. Reuer told the Record last Wednesday night.

Mr. Reuer, a Hamilton broker, would like to put twelve single family dwellings on the west side of Craddock Boulevard instead of 26 townhouse units, which he had previously considered for the area.

At Wednesday night's meeting of Jarvis council, Mr. Reuer and his lawyer, Hugh Slimon of Cayuga, presented a reference plan of Block D Registered Plan 54 to council members.

Mr. Slimon asked council to consider

passing a bylaw amending the zoning bylaw for twelve parts to R3 instead of R4, which would allow for the erection of single family dwellings.

Mr. Slimon also asked council to pass a bylaw removing the effect of a subdivision bylaw on these twelve parts because it would speed things up and cost less money.

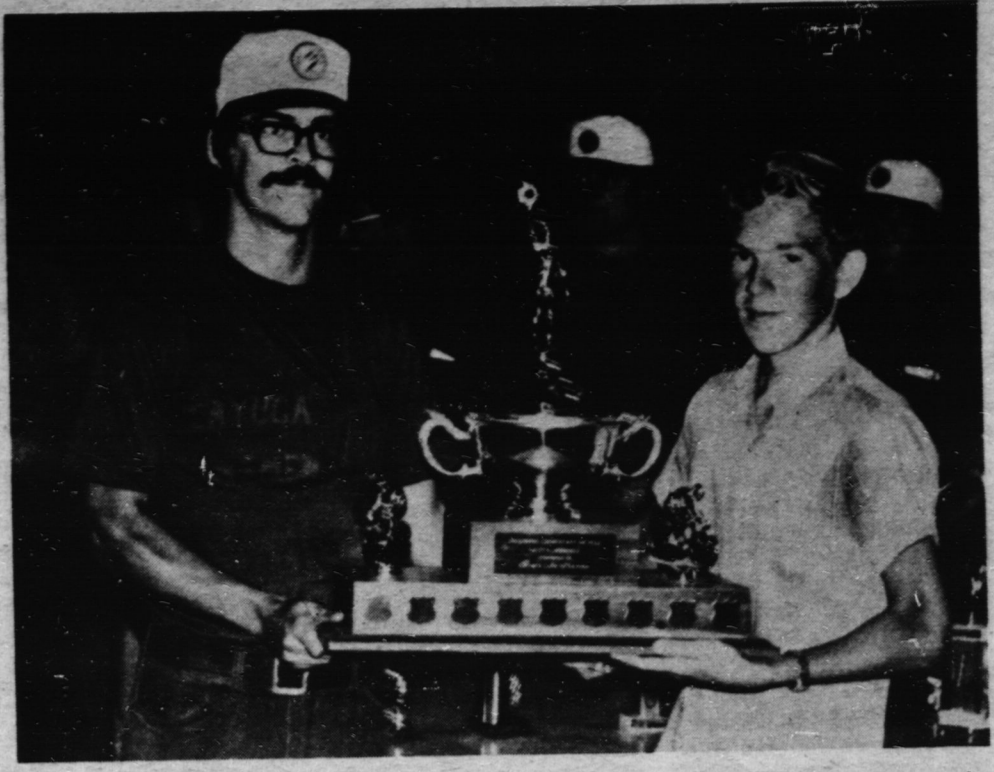
Mr. Slimon will draw up a bylaw and have it circulated.
