Today's meat prices "are not unreasonably high, not according to wages," says Lloyd Garner, proprietor of the Jarvis Meat Market. Mr. Garner, who has run the business on Main Street for the past 18 years, feels radio, television and newspapers "hound" on the food issue too much. "If they'd just keep their

mouth shut off on radio and television, it would soon rectify itself." Mr. Garner has been in the food business a long time and has seen quite a few changes. He moved to Jarvis in 1955 from Hamilton where he had worked for 8 1/2 years at the A & P Store on Ottawa Street. When he took over the

meat market from Harold Johnson, Mr. Garner did some alterations to the building. And since that time, he has expanded twice and put a new front on the store.

Mr. Garner doesn't plan any future expansion. "I'm going to retire if I can," he told the Record.

Mr. Garner doesn't think development in the area will affect Jarvis for a long time. In 20 years yes; but it won't grow overnight, he said. "I've seen this happen before . . . down in the east end of Hamilton."

Mr. and Mrs. Garner run the village meat, grocery and vegetable store by themselves in the building which dates back to the late 1800's. As far as Mr. Garner knows, it has always been a meat store.
