A Look At Business

DePauw's Hardware

The step from high school to running a hardware business is a big one, but Gary DePauw made it. He became manager and part owner of DePauw Pro Hardware a little less than ten months ago.

The business, at No. 1 Talbot Street, underwent a major facelift when Gary, his brother Raymond, and Roger DePauw, their father,

Mr. DePauw said future alterations or expansion would depend on how the area grows. "There's a lot of talk. Some say there won't be a change for a long time." But, Mr. DePauw hopes to rip off the back of the building someday and build a better storage area. And, if Jarvis develops, a furniture store might be included.

At any rate, Mr. DePauw hopes the village will gain some merchants instead of continuing to lose them. "We get a lot of business from new people in town," he said. It is the only store in the village where they can get many of the appliances and hardware goods available here, he added.

The hardware business, located on the corner of Highways 6 and 3 goes back a long ways. Before Mr. Fish's purchase of the store, it was run by Jim Patterson and Ed Carter, Robert W. Pedlow, Walter William and Mr. Mollo, who originally established the business in Jarvis.

DePauw's employs one person, Mrs. Mac Dosser.

"A credit union is a group of people with a common bond, who save their money together, and from this pool of savings make low-cost loans to one another." The Jarvis Community Credit Union was founded in 1954 because a group of Dutch immigrants wanted to help newcomers. Today, with 316 members and assets totalling \$156,116, it's membership is open to anyone.

Throughout the years, the Credit Union has

grown, made several moves and seen changes in its executive.

Although the credit union was originally founded in Germany in 1849 by Friedrich Wilhelm Raiffeisen to help the peasants in a time of famine, the Jarvis dutch people brought the concept over from Holland.

Immigrants couldn't get bank loans because they weren't known. Minnie Westerhuis, a long-time affiliate with the Credit Union, told the Record. So, there

was a need for a credit union.

On October 14th, the initial meeting of the Jarvis Community Credit Union was held in conjunction with the regular monthly meeting of the Dutch Immigration Society. A vote was taken favoring immediate application for a charter.

The second organizational meeting was held on November 19, 1954 in the Christian Reformed Church. Rudy Stegenga became the first treasurer.

In the early years, the Credit Union stayed among the Dutch; partly because they didn't have much money and partly because they didn't advertise.

In November of 1955, there were 33 members; total assets were \$2,300 and the loan maximum was \$200.

In 1958, Andy Westerhuis became treasurer and the Credit Union business was conducted from his Main Street home. A year later, it moved with the Westerhuis family to their R. R. 1 Jarvis farm. The work on the farm kept Mr. Westerhuis busy, so his wife took over, the running of Credit Union affairs.

In 1969, the Credit Union had 200 members, with total assets of \$60,059. \$2,000 was the maximum loan. With the steady increase of members, the Credit Union board decided it would be more practical and convenient to have an office within the town limits. The business was transferred to an office located next to Burke's restaurant.

Last summer they moved a few doors down the street and on August 1st, opened their office in the building which also houses George Walker's Insurance.

The Credit Union is operated by member-owners through the board of directors, which they elect at the annual meeting. The board may hire part or full-time staff people, but continues to be responsible for directing their activities, and charting the policies and progress of the credit union.

Jarvis' Board of Directors are: Mr. S. Kraay, President; Mr. M. Vander Molen, vice-president; Mr. E. Wybenga, secretary; Mr. T. VanderGaast; Mr. P. Salverda.

The Supervisory Committee consists of Mr. A. Kok, Mr. A. Norg and Mr. E. Cowan. Members of the Credit Committee are Mr. B. Elzinga, Mr. R. Stegenga and Mr. P. Hogeterp.

Mrs. Pat Cotts of R. 5 Hagersville succeeded Mrs. Westerhuis as treasurer of the Credit Union last December and works out of the Main Street office. Mrs. Westerhuis is now the assistant-treasurer.
