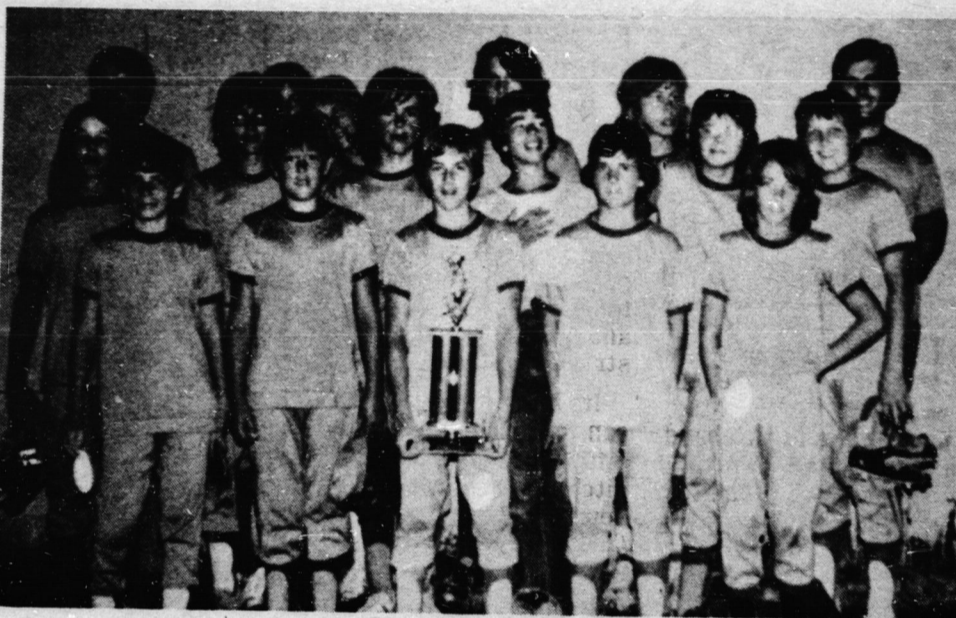
This week the Jarvis Bantams travel to Rodney, then come back home at 8:30 Friday night Sept. 1st. Get out to the park and give the boys your support.

## Season Tickets Selling Fast

Hagersville Flyer's Seasons Tickets are moving exceptionally well according to Flyer's Season Ticket Manager Earle Smith. "In our first two days during the Hagersville Sidewalk Sale, we sold 44 season's tickets, which is almost half the north section of the arena that we're making available."

"Our intention is to sell out the top three rows on the player's bench side of the arena first, and then if there's enough demand we'll move to the other side of the arena." Added Smith, "the holder of a season's ticket has a reserved seat during regular season, plus first call on the same seat during playoffs. A season's ticket would run 15 dollars for 15 home games, which is a saving of a quarter a game on the season. We've raised the adult general admission during the season to a \$1.25 this year."

Fans who are interested can drop into Mc-Master's Discount

see a ticket seating plan diagram or phone Earle Smith at 768-3488 for further details. "We're not collecting money right now," said Smith. "The idea is the person can choose his seat now, and when we know our schedule, we'll contact them a few weeks before the season starts so they can pick up their tickets."

The Flyer's executive also pointed out it was a good package for merchants. He explained, "Season's tickets can be used to promote business and good will. If a merchant buys a season's ticket(s) - even if he's not a hockey fan

and doesn't use them for himself - he does have customers who are hockey fans. By giving away a couple of tickets a week for each game, he creates good will for himself, and maybe some return business. At a dollar per ticket per game, in terms of financial outlay, it's some of the most inexpensive public relations for a salesman or businessman available."

Smith concluded, "We still have lots of good seats left on the north side section, and we'll be taking orders on a first come, first serve basis."
