## Rehearsals Begin At H.S.S. For "The Music Man"

Rehearsals for The Music Man, Hagersville Secondary School's 1974 operetta production began this week.

Meredith Willson's beautiful story of Harold Hill, a travelling salesman who moves from town to town selling the idea of a Boy's Band and then skips out before

forming one, will be performed at the school March 27, 28, 29 and 30th.

The American modern show writer stages the play in his own home town. And, it has a natural small town atmosphere, with some very lovable characters, George Shippey, director of the school's production, explained to the Record last week.

"It's a very entertaining play - music wise, script wise and cast wise."

Mr. Hill - The Music Man - leaves each small town Community he visits holding the bag with either no instruments or all the instruments and no band. Of course, they all lose their money... until he hits River City where his plans are foiled.

Mr. Shippey picked the Music Man for this year's production because of its entertainment value and its great music score. All the songs from The Music Man became popular.

Also, operettas at the school during the last couple of years depended on female leads. This whole play centres on Harold Hill, a male lead, he said.

The production, with a budget of \$3,500, will involve approximately 250 kids.
