## Wise, Unwise And Otherwise

**ADVENT**  
We are now in the season which some churches call "Advent" (or "Coming"). This is a penitential season something like Lent and is meant to prepare us for the joy of Christmas-time. However, there is one big difference. In Lent the emphasis is on the individual, in Advent the emphasis is more general. Advent extends from the beginning of December to Christmas Day.

In the Advent Collect there appear these words "When He shall come again in His glorious majesty to judge both the quick (living) and the dead! This note of preparation for the Second Coming and also the idea of judgement are the essential parts of the Advent message. - However, two other matters receive attention. One is concerned with the reading of the Bible and the other with men for the ministry.

We need this emphasis on the glorious majesty of God today. Let us face the matter squarely. If we believe in God we must believe that He is the Creator of all things, and we must believe that He is Righteous also. Evil cannot produce good and, in spite of the evil we see in the world today, there is also much goodness. How could an evil God create men who have a strong sense of right and wrong? The creature cannot be better than the Creator.

God is a righteous God, we must never forget that. It seems to me that we have over-emphasised the love of God and neglected His moral righteousness. Such an attitude has led men to think of God as weak. They think that it does not matter what we do, God will overlook it. Such an attitude leads to trouble, the strong characters despise such a God and the ordinary man considers himself, free to do whatever he likes. "There is no fear of God before his eyes."

The evidence of crime all around us, even in the highest offices of our great neighbor to the south is a graphic revelation of what can happen when God and His righteousness are ignored. We must, all of us, face the Judgement Throne of God and when we do this is our only plea will be that Jesus Christ died that my sins could be forgiven. In this way, by Himself paying the price of sin, God can forgive the sinner while maintaining His own righteousness.

Attention: The Editor: White explaining the reasons for regional government in the counties of Haldimand and Norfolk. I am well aware, as I'm sure we all are, of the need for well - organized, over-all planning in the area. My concern is that, contrary to what Mr. White would have us believe, our local administrators had no active or deciding part in choosing and formulating regional government. (Let us not be fooled by their apparent participation in government studies. It is still not really known how many or how few local submissions will be adapted into regional government when it is eventually defined.)

I take offense to Mr. White's suggestion that I hold a "different view" from that of my county council. They were never given the chance to vote "yes" or "no" on the issue of regional government, only on the date of implementation. Even in voting on a date of implementation, they felt the pressures from Toronto. May I mention only one - - the threat of the addition of Brant County to the region. Ironically, the possibility still exists.

In this so-called election, the voters are not choosing between regional government or some other form of government; not choosing what policies will or won't be followed, but are only choosing between candidates to carry out the orders of the provincial government.

It is no wonder the voters are apathetic to exercise their rights of choice. They know that it won't make any difference anyway.
