## Ebenezer Christian Reformed Church Celebrates 25th Anniversary

The Anniversary Sunday, of the Ebenezer Christian Reformed Church, November 25th started off with the regular morning worship service in the church auditorium, filled to capacity, and led by our former pastor Rev. Our membership is now as follows: 138 families, 293 communicant members, and 360 baptized members.

The afternoon service at 2:30 p.m. was led by Rev. Brouwer, with Rev. Dykstra participating as well. In this service, we gratefully commemorated God's care over us during the last 25 years. In unison the congregation confessed her sins to God and asked for his pardon in Jesus Christ.

Following the benediction by Rev. Dykstra, greetings were extended to the congregation by Rev. Perry of the Anglican Church, Rev. Taylor - Munro of the Presbyterian Church, Mr. Miller, Reeve of Walpole and Mr. Davidson, Reeve of Jarvis. A letter from Rev. Reeves of the United Church (who was unable to attend) expressing the best wishes of the families of that church, was received as well.

On Wednesday evening the congregation met together again, this time in the Jarvis Community Hall for an evening of festivities with former pastors and members. With a crowd of more than 450 people, the hall was overflowing. Under the able leadership of our pastor, Rev. Brouwer, we began with the singing of "We Praise Thee O God." Scripture reading was taken from Psalm 92 and having led us in prayer, Rev. Brouwer gave a special word of welcome to our former ministers, Rev. Dykstra and Rev. Los and friends.

As in a regular meeting minutes were read, but this time from the past 25 years, by Mrs. A. Hoogenboom, who has for all those years kept a scrapbook about the congregation. The entertainment was provided by the Brass Band, organized for the evening, consisting of former members
