Hagersville Police Report

The following is the monthly activities of the Hagersville Police Dept. for November. REPORT

The officers investigated six traffic accidents during this month, with no personal injury, but extensive property damage. Three reportables - over \$200.00 and three non-reportables. Under traffic enforcement, 23 charges were laid under the H. T. A.; three charges under 418 O. Regulation; two charges under M.V.A.C.A. - "no

insurance." The officers tagged three vehicles for improper parking, issued 16 traffic warnings.

The department laid five charges under the Juvenile Delinquents Act, and charged six persons under the Liquor Control Act. One stolen auto, recovered but burnt - out and two stolen bicycles.

Under General occurrences, there were 177 recorded, four investigations for other forces, and 12 requests for assistance rendered. Four premises found insecure and two requests for unoccupied residence checks. One child reported missing and found. The officers clocked 4,852 miles during this month, patrolling.

History Of Hagersville

The properties destroyed and their approximate losses on buildings and stocks are as follows; Howard Hager, Regah Theatre and Masonic Temple building, \$16,000; W. J. Smith & Son, Hardware store and residence, \$25,000; L.B. Gowan, furniture store and undertaking parlors, \$18,000; Dr. Bone owner of the building in which laundry and shoe repairing shop was situated, \$2,500; Lee Fung, laundry machinery and stock, \$1,000; A. Sabola, shoe repairing machinery and stock, \$3,100; D. N. Almas, two seed mills and office, \$17,000; Dr. Hyde, dental parlors, \$4,000; D. A. Swing, plow works and equipment, \$4,000; Alex. Marshall, feed barn and feed, \$8,000; J. Leng, blacksmith shop, \$2,000; Town Feed Stable; tenated by Ed Margettis, \$2,500.

The losses on the properties and stocks destroyed will be about half covered by insurance, some owners being well protected and others carrying a light insurance.

Other properties in the neighborhood of the fire had close calls, Beswetherick's sales stable adjoining a building destroyed and the properties on the opposite side of the street owned by Henry Byers, J. H. Head & Sons and C. R. Evans were right in the heat zone and were badly scorched and windows broken. Fleming Bros. garage also had a close call.

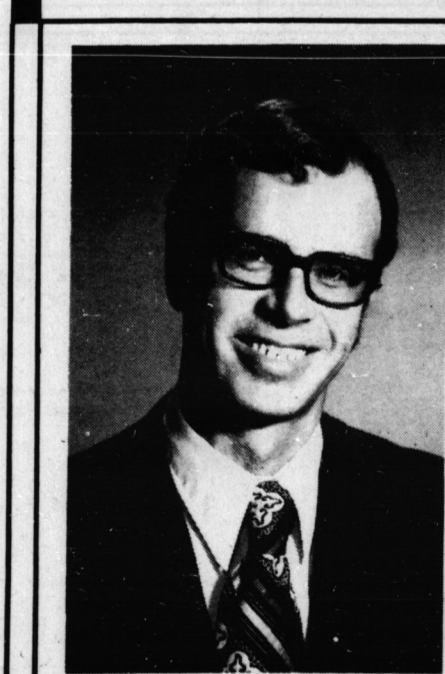
