Whether she was really questioning since she wasn't a qualified teacher. Mr. Mackereth put all the volunteers to rest on this issue.
Sure, you're not teachers, he said, but to me a person doesn't have to have a special certificate in order to help.
Diane Blundell expressed concern that some children forget their times table when she is quizzing them because they are nervous or afraid. She explained she has been working with different students each week and felt her work might be more effective if she helped the same students each week rather than working with new ones. On the whole, however, she found the children great to work with.
Betty Reu expressed similar sentiments in regard to her work with Special Education students. They're not hard to work with and they flock around dying for attention, she said.
The volunteers are: Kay Wingrove who helps grade 3 and 4 students by listening to them read, utilizing the flash cards for math, making cookies, marking spelling and looking up Christmas stories for classroom reading.
Sheryl McLeish marks art, listens to reading, sometimes using a tape recorder, helps students with their multiplication tables and cut-outs.
Sandra McDowell makes up games for grade 3 and 4 students to use on rainy days, has showed a film and listens to reading.
Betty Reu helps Special Education children with their alphabet, reading, math and games — anything the

a year and we're not that.
Dr. David Marshall, an interested liberal, Lyle Furry, president of the Haldimand Progressive Conservative Association, Chester Faulkner, riding chairman for the N.D.P. and Bob McKenzie, provincial executive of the N.D.P., spoke to the group and answered questions.
Dr. Marshall termed the Bill forced labor with no justification. However, the government is trying to convince the people that teaching is a vital public service, he said. That is their way out — to convince, the people of this one little lie.
Mr. Furry said he has not followed the complexities of Bill 274, but he was not disturbed about the idea of compulsory arbitration.
Mr. McKenzie said the N. D. P. believe teachers are entitled to full collective bargaining as well as strike action.
Mr. Faulkner asked for a return to a humanistic democracy.

Duxbury Re-elected Chairman

"We have survived" were the opening words of Chairman Don Duxbury at Tuesday night's Board of Education meeting.
Director Jake Fransen reported on some of the results of Tuesday's walk-out by many Haldimand teachers.
He said 100 out of 208 elementary school teachers were in class, while there was a 10.4 (531) per cent student attendance.
At the secondary level, Mr. Fransen said 10 out of 175 teachers were present, while 3.4 (97) per cent of Haldimand's Secondary School students were in school.
Also at the meeting, Mr. Duxbury and Garfield Disher were re-elected chairman and vice-chairman for the 1974 term.
The board will be called Haldimand Board of Education, omitting the word county, when regional government is implemented.
