Firemen Kept Busy

Hagersville Volunteer Firemen, headed by their Fire Chief William McClarty, have recently been called for their services, despite the sub-zero temperatures.

Friday evening, December 7th a call was received from the Police Answering Service, at 10:35 p.m., to an automobile on fire, just off Main Street North, adjacent to the large Hamilton Spectator sign.

There, firemen quickly extinguished flames in the back seat of an abandoned automobile, which had been stolen in Brantford. The owner resides in St. Thomas. The Fire Chief stated, "arson was highly suspected in this case, which is under further investigation." On Friday, December 14th at 7:05 p.m. the firemen were called to Dufferin Quarries to a fire in the Workshop, which was determined to have been caused by a Salamander heater.
