

Mufflers Will Be Used At The Speedway In '74

Wayne Conroy, Manager of Cayuga International Speedway, has announced that mufflers will be used by all late model Super Stock cars that race at Cayuga International Speedway in 1974.

In making the announcement, Conroy said that the noise generated by the powerful 500 h.p. "Plus" racing cars become a matter of

concern for the spectators and drivers alike. Delaware International Speedway, located near London, Ontario, will join with us in using the mufflers. To the best of our knowledge, we are the first to take this step in Canadian auto racing," said Conroy. "By putting a stop to the ever growing noise problem, we feel that this is a

good neighbour policy as well as a step toward better racing." Conroy added.

From a driver standpoint the noise produced by the 140 mph racing cars can be a serious problem. Some drivers can't hear properly for hours after a race, which obviously means that they can't

give that little extra concentration while driving. With the mufflers, they can be more relaxed.

The mufflers have been used by at least three of the top drivers that competed at Cayuga and Delaware last season. Ed Howe and Tom Muir, both of Michigan and Jim

Bickerstaff of Ohio, raced with them and all three were among the fastest qualifiers in every race that they entered. Tom Muir stated after a race that the muffler will not take any power or performance away. The addition of these mufflers is less than \$18.00 each.

The fans showed their

appreciation for the mufflers when the Cayuga Track Announcer asked for it at a race last season. The crowd gave a 100% backing. One fan said that with the mufflers, new sounds can be heard. The squeal of tires and the howling transmissions add a new and exciting dimension to the sounds of racing.

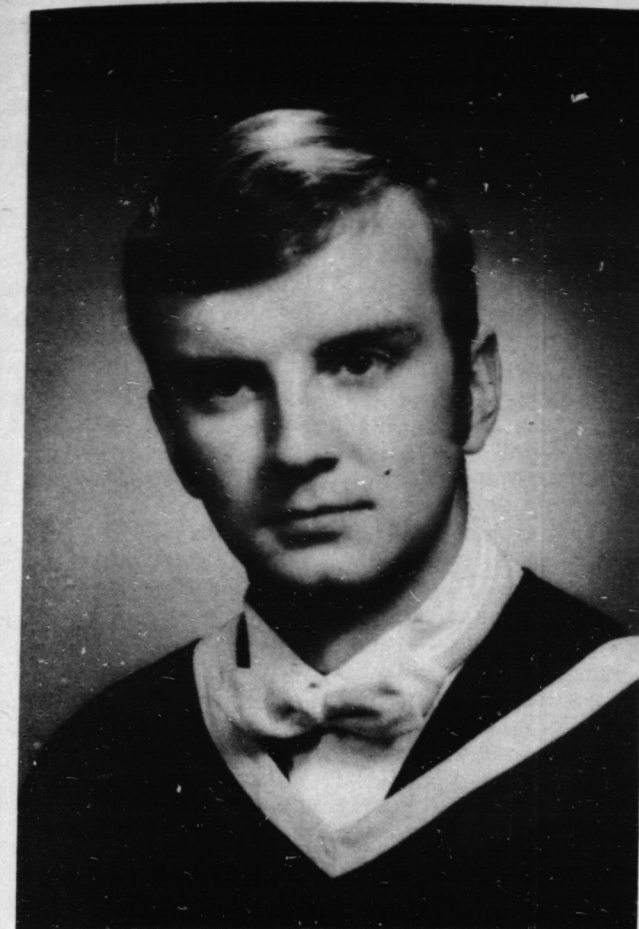

Christmas When The West Was Young

In the West's first settlement at Red River (now Winnipeg), the Scots, whom Lord Selkirk brought there in 1812, celebrated the Christmas feast as a close-knit community. It was here that "Hurl", played by teams between goals on the ice, using sticks and a ball, not a puck, is supposed to have marked the origin of hockey in Canada. In the evening everyone danced to the bagpipes. Not until 1820 was the Christmas season celebrated as a religious festival in the two mission churches (French - Catholic and English - Protestant). But Red River folk saw sad times in the Christmas of 1821, when each person in the settlement was rationed to one pint of wheat a day, boiled into a thin soup.

By 1831, Joseph James Hargrave was able to describe a happier Christmas, for now Red River was a well-established Hudson's Bay Company post. For months before the holiday, loaded dog teams were bringing an abundance of supplies into the trading stores
