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## EDITORIAL COMMENT

### Lower Unemployment Is A People Effort

In the October federal election, we told the Liberal government that our high rate of unemployment was unacceptable. The message was taken to heart and out came a \$500 million work incentive program and new unemployment insurance legislation.

Neither Quebec or Ontario can cry about their share of the winter works booty. Each received approximately one third of the federal government's 350 million Winter Capital Projects Fund.

Provincial allocations were: Newfoundland, \$12 million; P.E.I., \$3 million; Nova Scotia, \$14 million; New Brunswick, \$13.8 million; Quebec, \$113.9 million; Ontario, \$106.4 million; Manitoba, \$13.4 million; Saskatchewan, \$13.1 million; Alberta, \$22.2 million; B.C., \$37.3 million; Yukon Territory, \$300,000; N.W.T., \$600,000.

However, the people and provincial governments must also remember that Ottawa is not entirely to blame for unemployment. The provinces have a responsibility to deal with unemployment and a duty to initiate schemes to alleviate job problems. The provincial governments should also be using their control over economic policies to guard against rising unemployment.

The tightening of those unemployment insurance purse strings should also encourage more people to read the Want Ads and cut down on the number of opportunists taking advantage of the system.

Under the present scheme, it's possible to work eight weeks, quit, then live off unemployment insurance for the next 51 weeks. Is this fair? Under the new plan, people who voluntarily quit their jobs without just cause or who get fired for misconduct won't be able to collect. Anyone who refuses to accept a suitable job offer without good cause could also be denied benefits.

When "going out" benefits skyrocket from \$694 million to almost \$2 million within two years, a change won't be soon enough.

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## Federation News

Metro Toronto garbage to be dumped in Wellington county came under lengthy discussion at the January meeting of O.F.A. directors.

The Ont. Ministry of the Environment has already approved in principle a number of sites for the dumping of garbage in the amount of 400,000 tons per year.

Both railroads and trucking firms have expressed interest in the hauling of garbage to the rural areas of the province. Deep pits or trenches would be dug and filled with garbage and then covered with earth. Danger of contamination of the ground water with the dumping of garbage in such large amounts is a major concern - even the O.W.R.C. would approve of this practice.

Industrial waste has been hauled into Walpole Township recently, some of which was dumped into a pit containing water. When water started to become

discoloured where the material was being dumped, the Haldimand Federation drew it to the attention of the O.W.R.C. and received assurance that it was not harmful. But as time went on, the water coloured to a pretty shade of green and the dumping of waste into the water became bad enough that it was not allowed to remain in the pit and is being pumped into the water streams that flow through the township.

If the O.W.R.C. was in error in their judgement in Walpole township, their assurance that the dumping of 400,000 tons of garbage a year in Wellington county would not damage the water table, doesn't give very much comfort.

The O.F.A. is requesting the government to prevent the dumping of city garbage in rural areas and establish a recycling policy.
