Disaster Avoided

Hagersville Volunteer Firemen quickly responded to a call at 8:50 last Thursday morning. Fire Chief William McCarty directed firefighting operations when a York Cartage Service Transport carrier from Toronto required the firemen's assistance. The transport stopped on No. 6 Highway, immediately in front of Northview School, when the brakes on the tanker didn't release properly. It caught on fire at the right-rear dual.

The only damage was to the brakes.

Principal J.R. Lundy, assisted by the members of the teaching staff, escorted all students to the rear of the Northview schoolyard until all danger had subsided.

What could have been a real disaster was quickly and efficiently avoided, due to the rapid action of Hagersville Firemen. The transport tanker was loaded with fueloil which was being transported to the Nanticoke Hydro Plant, at Lake Erie.

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
