Speaks At Guides

Fireman Neil Somerville was special speaker at the Guides' meeting last Monday evening at the I.O.O.F. Hall on Main Street North. He told the girls about fire precautions, hazards and fire prevention. Neil is a member of the Hagersville Volunteer Fire Department.

County Federation of Agriculture has made note of the fact that farmers are the largest holders of land but that almost everyone else is prepared to plan its use. Accordingly, the committee feels that farmers should learn what planning is, who is or should be doing the planning and what the farmer should be doing about it. All farmers in Haldimand should plan to attend on March 8.

Results of the Corn Harvest and Storage study conducted through Haldimand Soil and Crop Improvement Association show a considerable difference in costs using different storage systems. Costs on the 1972 crop will obviously be higher than normal. The difference in costs between the systems may however be meaningful. Custom harvest drying and storage costs ranged from 55 to 59 cents per bushel. Storing corn in cribs and handling to market cost from 33 to 34 cents per bushel. Home storage of the crop in silos as high moisture corn cost from 25 to 32 cents per bushel. Most of the difference in this case happened because of the different silo overhead costs.

The study will be repeated in 1973 with a hope that harvest costs are nearer to normal. Participation of more co-operators in this project of Haldimand Soil and Crop Improvement Association would be welcome. Information and membership would be available from directors of the association or from the Haldimand Office of the Extension Branch, Ontario Ministry of Agriculture & Food, Cayuga.

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Jarvis Council Briefs

At last week's council meeting: Council moved that they sell the chicken barn of Bert Pennings former property to Andy Hogeveen of Tyrrell for \$1 to be removed from the premises by May 31, 1973.

Council is going to apply for a supplementary subsidy of \$1,500 for construction from the Department of Transport and Communications.

Council decided more inspections of sanitary sewers on Talbot Street should be made before work is started to permanently rectify blockage problems.

Village consultants recommended clearing the sewers and inspecting them again before spending any money.

The cost of clearing and inspecting was estimated at \$800, but the cost of relaying the whole sewer was estimated at \$5,000. Estimates for relaying only the portion between blockages was \$3,250, however, consultants advised there might be considerable amount of salvagable sewer there.

Flyers Take Two In Play-offs
