Haldimand Junior Farmers hold their Annual Meeting and Pot Luck Supper at Kohler on Friday, January 5, starting at 7:00 p.m.

The annual meeting for Haldimand Plowmen's Association is to be held starting at 8:30 p.m. on Saturday, January 6, at Haldimand Agricultural Centre, Kohler.

The current price for livestock ration protein sources such as soybean oil meal makes the growing of soybeans worth considering for 1973. Dairymen and beef producers will be more likely to also consider the use of urea as a protein source where possible.

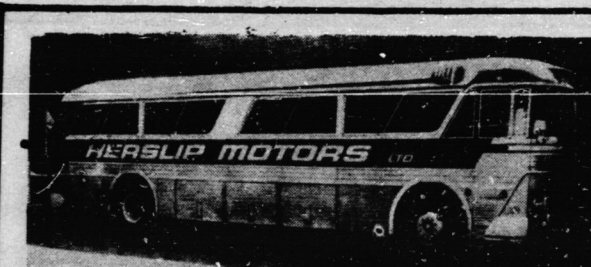
two by Bill Wicker to take a 3-0 lead to the dressing room after the first period.
