A basic herd cannot be started nor increased since the change in Tax Legislation effective for the tax year 1971. In some cases, if not all, since the basic herd is a capital item it is subject to Capital Gains Tax.

As long as the total herd is larger than the basic herd can be maintained. In some cases a farmer may elect to reduce the basic herd. However, this reduction may only be the least of the number of animals disposed of in the year or ten percent of the basic herd as of December 31, 1971.
