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In laying his case before the Minister of Public Works and the House of Commons, Mr. Knowles cited instances of loss of valuable tobacco and orchard land well in excess of \$100,000 as well as the threat to numerous cottages, public docks and other facilities. Pointing to the damage incurred by such regions as the Long Point area, Mr. Knowles demanded that some immediate measures must be taken if further damages are to be avoided.

Under a proposal placed before the House of Commons, Mr. Knowles called on the Minister of Public Works to authorize installation of breakwaters at key strategic points while at the same time steps should be undertaken to let more water out of the lakes at such points as the Michigan Canal. Although Mr. Knowles feels that such steps as those proposed by him are useful in the interim, the government should also formulate some long-term strategies and provide financial compensation.

In response to Mr. Knowles' request, Jean-Eudes Dube, Minister of Public Works, said there is no act of parliament which specifically provides assistance for the rising of the water level of Lake Erie.

"Problems of this nature and the measures to be taken for their rectification are the responsibility of the concerned departments of the provincial government. However, in certain cases the federal government can act on a specific request from the province."

"My advice to the honourable member for Norfolk - Haldimand is that he contact the provincial authorities and have them, as they see fit, approach us for whatever assistance they seek."

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for a new credit more suited to his abilities. Many students in schools across Ontario are taking courses offered in two different years. Some are taking courses from three different year levels. Thus, it is misleading to ask "What grade are you in?" since the answer often doesn't tell everything. "I'm in grade eleven, but I'm taking courses from grade ten and one from grade twelve." Most schools have done away with 'Grades 9 to 13' and are calling them 'Year One to Year Five.'

Do the changes make any difference? Yes, for many students who in earlier days would have failed a year with 3 failures and 55%, they do matter. That student would have taken five years to get a four year diploma, completely repeating one year, passes and failures. In the present system, that student would get credit for 5, and if he could settle down and get 7, 7 and 8 credits in the next three years, he would still get his diploma in four years.

The idea of passing and failing now depends on each individual credit, rather than on the average, which is now hardly ever considered.

Next week, I would like to take at some of the strengths and weaknesses of the new system, from an educator's point of view.

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Jump In Forage Seed Prices Expected

Ontario farmers will soon be looking for alfalfa, trefoil, brome, and timothy for spring seeding of forage crops. The problem is, this year, seed is expected to be scarce, and unfortunately for the buyer, higher priced, says K. E. Fallis, Associate Director, Soils and Crops Branch, Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food.

Harvest yields of forage seed crops in 1972 have generally been lower than normal. For example, Ontario had the smallest timothy seed crop in 20 years. Carry-over of timothy seed as of September 1, 1972 was down

a million pounds from a year ago. Alfalfa inventories are down by three-quarters of a million pounds, red clover down by 155,000 pounds, and brome-grass down by 619,000 pounds. On inventory, the trefoil situation may appear better, but this is misleading. Production in both Ontario and neighboring states of the U.S. was disappointing.

Last year's new seedlings had a hard time, with flood and frost, and demand for seed will be keen. Farmers should order early, and make the best possible use of available seed supplies. Certified seed will pro-
