

Roll out half and line a 9-inch pie plate. Roll out top crust. Place half apple slices in pastry shell. Mix dry ingredients; sprinkle half over apple slices. Place remaining apples on top, heaping them in the centre. Sprinkle remaining sugar mixture over top. Dot with butter. Cover with top crust. Seal and flute the edge; slash top.

Bake in preheated 425° oven for 15 minutes. Reduce heat to 325° and bake 30 minutes longer. Makes one 9-inch pie — 6-8 servings.




