brass works, furniture, paintings and many more collectible items - some from Mexico and some from Canada.

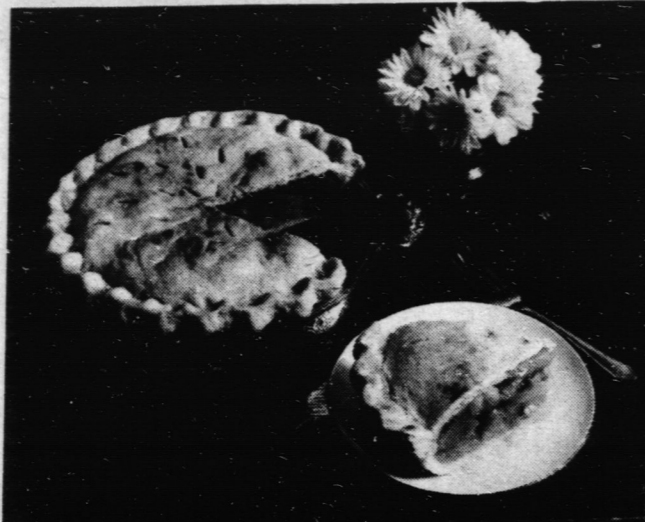
"People don't realize the value of antiques," Richard said. They throw things in the dump (eg. old fruit jars valued at \$13 a piece). "We should worry about our heritage . . . our past."

Richard describes himself as "a person who likes art" and Pam, who studied in Mexico

and Miami, has a degree in interior decorating and art.

Besides paintings done by E. Robert Ross, M. F. Samson and more, the shop also features some of Pam and Richard's work.

Edam-Apple Pie is made with a crust flavoured with imported Holland Edam cheese. Nutty, mild cheese flavour is baked right into the pie.

EDAM-APPLE PIE

If you like cheese with your apple pie, you'll really enjoy this. Plump, juicy apples are baked in a cheese-flavoured crust so the flavour is built right in.

The mild, nutty flavour of Holland imported Edam is ideal with cooked or fresh fruit. If you haven't time to prepare dessert, try serving an imported Baby Edam at room temperature with a platter of fresh fruit such as grapes, apples, pears or plums.

Dough:

- 3/4 cup boiling water
- 3/4 cup shortening
- 1 tablespoon milk
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups all-purpose flour, sifted
- 1 1/2 cups shredded imported Holland Edam

Filling:

- 1 can (19 oz.) apple pie filling OR 6 apples, peeled and sliced
- 3/4 cup granulated sugar
- 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine

Preheat oven to 425°. Add boiling water to shortening. Blend with fork to make a smooth, thick paste. Mix in milk and salt. Add flour and shredded Edam; mix well with fingertips until the dough holds together.

Roll out half and line a 9-inch pie plate. Roll out top crust. Place half apple slices in pastry shell. Mix dry ingredients; sprinkle half over apple slices. Place remaining apples on top, heaping them in the centre. Sprinkle remaining sugar mixture over top. Dot with butter. Cover with top crust. Seal and flute the edge; slash top. Bake in preheated 425° oven for 15 minutes. Reduce heat to 325° and bake 30 minutes longer. Makes one 9-inch pie - 6-8 servings.

Election Expenses Bill

A sweeping reform of the rules governing federal election campaigns is proposed in the Election Expenses Bill introduced in the House of Commons by Privy Council President Allan MacEachen.

Some of the provisions of the Bill would limit election spending (thirty cents per eligible voter in every riding in which a party has an official candidate), require disclosure of names of those who contribute in excess of \$100 shorten time period for political advertising, and remove broadcast commentary restrictions during final hours of election campaigns.

Tax Refunds on The Way

As of June 21, the Department of National Revenue processed almost eight million tax returns - \$2,202,793 refunds, totalling nearly \$1 billion have been sent to taxpayers. Some two and a half million returns remain to be processed and most of these are expected to be handled by the end of the month.

Price Parity For Cars

Industry, Trade and Commerce Minister Alastair Gillespie said in the House of Commons that he intends "to hold the automobile companies to their commitment" to reduce the price difference between Canadian and American-built cars.

Pensions to Increase 24%

Veterans Affairs Minister Dan MacDonald's Bill to increase the basic annual pension for disabled war veterans by 24% over the current rate being paid, received speedy passage in the House of Commons.

Following Senate approval and Royal Assent, the basic pension would increase to \$4,704 from the present \$3,793 a year, an increase of \$911. Married pensioners would receive \$5,880 a year, an increase of \$1,047.

Housing Crisis

Urban Affairs Minister Ron Basford continues to voice concern over the increasing cost of housing in Canada. In Vancouver, he said the rate at which housing prices have been rising is "unacceptable" and "the situation is intolerable -- not only for low-income people who are perhaps the hardest hit but for middle-income families as well."

The minister has asked Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) to produce proposals to remedy some of the problems. "All public land held by the federal government is now being examined in terms of its potential for residential development and, where, it seems suitable, plans are being developed to get it onto the market."

4H Conservation Club

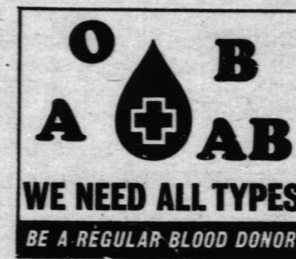
The third meeting of the Haldimand 4-H Conservation Club was held June 27 at the Taquanah Conservation Area.

After the presentation, Kim Topp read the minutes of the last meeting. We then discussed a project for this year's club.

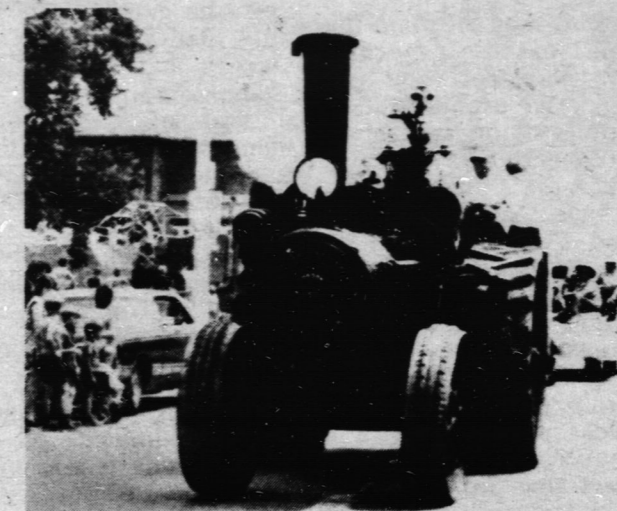
The club decided to form two groups. One group would be responsible for planning and presenting a demonstration to be put on at
