Request Rejected By Reserve Council

A request to take pictures or make sketches of the Pauline Johnson house on the Six Nations Reserve was recently rejected by the Six Nations' elected council.

Council voted 8-4 against a motion by Councillor Nina Burnham, when she sought permission for the Holt, Rhinehart and Winston publishing company of Toronto to take photographs, or to make sketches of the home. These were to be used in a book to be published on the Indian poetess. The request was made by the company through the Mohawk Institute in Brantford.

Publishers also de-

sired to make similar prints of a piano in the house, and of a replica of Miss Johnson in costume. In support of the motion, Councillor Syd Henhawk said "the tourist revenue from the house had suffered in the past, so this would be the next best thing to advertising." Council seemed reluctant to grant the request, perhaps because it had turned down a similar request by Reader's Digest in the past.

Situated between Cainsville and Caledonia, the Johnson home is on Highway 54, providing a scenic view of the Grand River, as well as being a historic landmark.

Named To Order Of Canada

The latest honour to be bestowed upon Dr. Joseph Hill of the Six Nations' Indian Reserve was when he was named as a member of the Order of Canada.

Dr. Hill received this

much deserved honour on June 27, and has been described by close family friend, Florence Yeigh as "having the greatest impact of any person, white or Indian on the education of the Indian..."

The Mohawk Indian of the Wolf Band has also been recognized with an honorary Doctor of Law degree from the University of Western Ontario in 1970, as well as the Ontario Education Association Centennial Award in 1960 for service and leadership in education.

His Indian name, meaning the Great Teacher, was given to him at the time he was named an Honorary Chief of all the Six Nations' tribes - he being the first and only person to receive this distinction.

Dr. Hill's wife, the former Florence Smith, is a graduate of Macdonald Institute at Guelph and is presently in charge of Home Economics throughout the reservation schools.

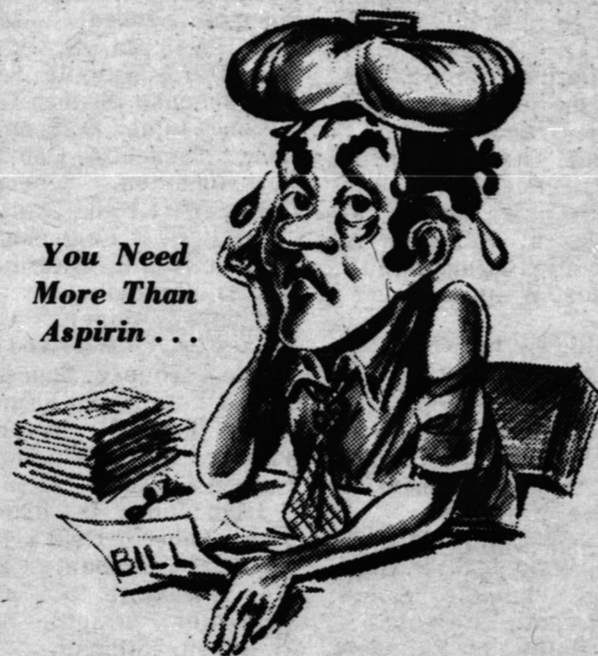

Mr. Smith will take the council seat left vacant by the late Rev. Gordon Hill, who passed away in June.

When nominations closed at the deadline, Mr. Smith was the only nominee and was making his first bid at an elected office.

Cemetery History

Recently, the Hagersville Cemetery Board appointed a committee to research and prepare a brief history of the cemetery.

Mr. Lorne McKenzie, Mr. John W. Park and Mr. Norman Graham, related that the first meeting to form the Hagersville Cemetery Company was held on April 27, 1894. J. W. Park was elected as president, with Secretary-Treasurer being J. H. Hager.

Approximately five acres of land was purchased from James Fawcett, one mile west of Hagersville, with the sum of \$490 paid for this land.

According to an older ledger, money was loaned to the cemetery company by various individuals until the budget could be balanced.

Rev. Thomas S. Howard was the first person to purchase two lots of two graves each, on January 4, 1895. The second person was Samuel W. Howard on the same date, with the third being Mary Bell, on March 11 1895.

Presently, the 1973 Cemetery Board consists of the following members: President - James Hewitt; Vice-Pres. - Gerald Hymas; Members - R. F. Aldes, Ralph Carrick, Earl Catherwood, Norman Graham, William Mott, Lorne McKenzie, J. W. Park, Bruce Reynolds, and Clarence Winger. Secretary - Treasurer, Arthur Roth.

Mr. Murdoch also complained of the poor drainage from the townhouses. One third of the building's water comes over to my place, he said.

Council agreed that if no action is taken immediately by Jerry Wannop, owner of the townhouse complex, the drainage matter will be turned over to the village solicitor.

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
