Race "Rookies" In Top 20

As Late Model Super Stock racing starts its mid-season at Cayuga International Speedway, three out of the eight "Rookie" drivers are running in the top twenty positions in the Red Cap Cayuga International Speedway points championship.

The Speedway, Canada's largest and fastest, hosts the top drivers in the country on a weekly basis. Speeds of 135 m.p.h. on the two main straights are common while the tracks average speed record stands at 106 m.p.h. and is held by Ed Howe of Beaverton, Michigan. The record was set recently during the trials for the fourth event in the \$100,000 Export "A" Stock Car Series of Champions.

Leading the list of rookie drivers is Ron Snyder of Kitchener, Ontario. Driving a 1969 Chevelle, the Kitchener charger has scored 106 points in the Red Cap fund and stands in fifth place, only six points out of a three way battle for second between Harold Brown of Brantford, Bill Watson of Toronto and Canada's newest

sensation in the rich NASCAR GrandNational racing, Earl Ross of London, Ontario.

Leading the \$5,000 Red Cap fund is Art Clark of West Seneca, New York. Clark has scored 126 points.

Drivers score 30 points to win, 29 for second, 28 for third and so on down to last place in the 24 car starting fields in the regular Friday night action.

The second highest rookie in the standings is Gary May of Mt. Hope, Ontario. May has 74 points and stands 13.

Third highest of the rookie drivers is Jr. Hanley of Halifax, Nova Scotia. Hanley entered the season June 8 and in that short time has scored 69 points for 15 in the standings. His best placing to date came June 22 when he finished fifth in the feature.

The final meeting of Jarvis Community Chest Executive was held at the home of the President, Robert Doughty at Nanticoke on Thursday evening last. Treasurer Ed Stire, Campaign manager Earl Slater, Secretary Mrs. Clifford McBride and Press Reporter Mrs. R. A. Miller were present.

The Treasurer reported the Emergency fund in the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce at the beginning of the Campaign as approximately \$400.00. This fund is kept fairly static in the event of any local calamity - to be used in the area. Expenses regarding this year's campaign, printing stationary and honoraria was \$110.16. Total collection for 1973 was \$3,077.75. After deducting the above expenses, \$2,967.59 remained.

Each of 11 charities were issued cheques of \$269.00. The remaining \$6.49 was added to the Emergency Fund, already in the Bank. This was most gratifying as the objective had been set at \$2,800.00, showing a surplus collected of \$167.59 and donated.

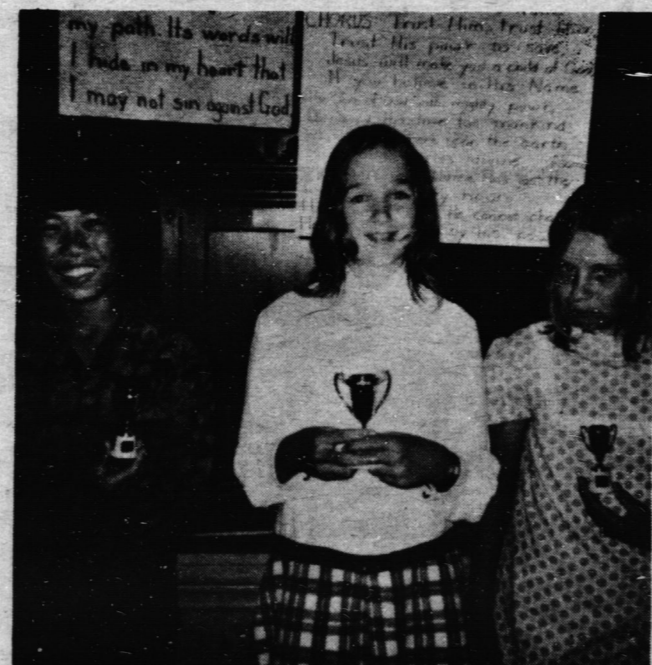
ren's Fund, Canadian Diabetic Society, St. John's Ambulance Association.
