The girls will be shown much of southern Ontario, Mr. Williamson said, and will also be the guests of honour at a Lions Family Night on August 7th.

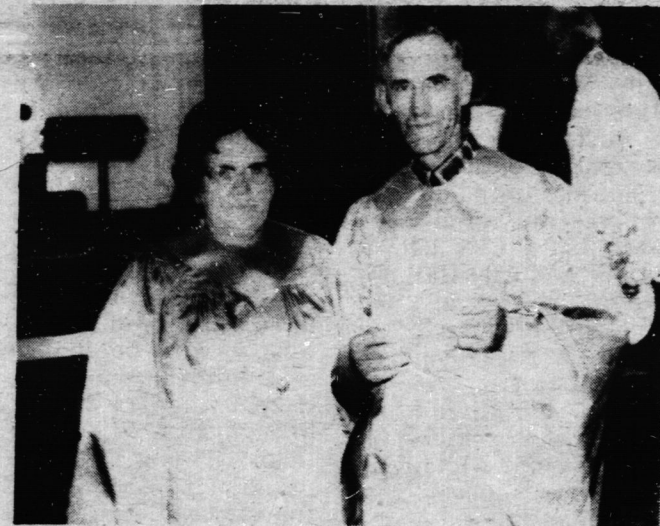
Carillon Dedicated Sun.
