Doherty was referring to a recent rule change which requires all officials under CAHA jurisdiction (that includes the OHA) to wear protective head gear this season. "The referee is out there on the ice for a full 60 minutes. and anything that can lessen the chance of injury for a referee or linesman is good."

Commenting on the hockey played during the European tour, Doherty said, "The Europeans are good - make no mistake about it, and we can learn a lot from them, But I like the Canadian brand of hockey and I think we'll always be able to beat the Europeans. Their systems are just too regimented. But our systems and style of play produce a certain something in the players - I don't know what it is - that keeps us one step ahead of the Euro-
