A five-man filming crew will be filming the Six Nations reserve from July 17-20, to complete a documentary on Ontario reserves. The film, "The Long Journey," will include segments of Indian life on poorer, and more progressive reserves in the province.

Barbara Shaw, audio-visual head with the information branch of the Department of Indian and Northern Affairs, said "Primarily, it is to show progress of what is happening in reserves all across Ontario." Lee Gordon, an employee of the department who accompanied Mrs. Shaw, said about 75 per cent of the filming has already been done on seven other reserves.

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Jarvis Native Honoured

A native Jarvis man, Bill Duxbury, ended 17 years of principalship at Stouffville District Secondary School this year to the sorrow of his many students and staff members.

He has accepted the position of principal at Markham District High School, beginning in September.

Several clippings from the Tribune, a newspaper serving the Stouffville community, brought into the Record, describes the respect and affection Mr. Duxbury has earned as head of the school. And, the farewell tribute paid to him by his pupils.

Mr. Duxbury, "The Duke," was raised on the family farm near Jarvis which is now operated by his brother, Donald.

He attended Jarvis elementary continuation school and Hagersville High before entering

McMaster University; and finally, O.C.E. in Toronto.

Mr. Duxbury's first post was in Caledonia where he specialized in teaching math and science.

After serving four years there, the young teacher became principal of Cayuga High School. At that time, it was a small school with six staff members and 150 students.

In 1956, Stouffville District High School Board received and accepted Mr. Duxbury's application for the position of principal. There were 200 students and nine staff members when the school opened that September. Now, 17 years later, the school is comprised of 60 teachers and a student enrollment swollen to more than 1,000.
