The boys picked up two runs in the 6th as Chuck Anderson reached on an error and scored when Fryett unloaded his triple. Fryett then raced home on a fly ball by Craig McKeen. Anderson also scored the winning run after reaching second on an error. He moved to third on an infield out and scored on Danny Donato's fly ball.

Tillsonburg had Johnson on the ropes in the 5th but couldn't put him away. They scored two runs and had the bases loaded before Johnson bore down and struck out the side.

Jim Vanni played a steady game at short and came up with two sparkling plays. One was a diving catch of a sinking liner, while

later he picked up a slow rolling grounder bare handed and threw to first in time to nip the runner.

The biggest play of the game was made by Dave House in the 9th inning. With Hagersville leading 4-3, Tillsonburg put two runners on base with only one out. B. Schwyer slapped a ball down the line in right field that House just got to for a game saving running catch.

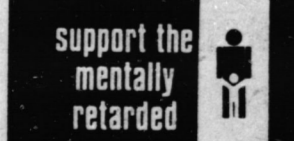

Harvesters Win 5th To Compete In

"Run The Bases"

Hagersville Minor Ball teams will compete in the run the bases programme sponsored by the Canadian Federation of Amateur Baseball. This programme will be run in all towns in the Southern Counties Baseball Association. It is a money raising project where the players solicit sponsors who donate funds according to the speed the boy circles the bases.

Maximum rate that a boy can collect is a \$1.00 per sponsor if he travels around the bases in 10-20 seconds. Between 21 and 30 seconds the price is 75¢ then it drops to 50¢ for a 31-40 second effort. Any speed over 40 seconds

the sponsor only has to pay 25¢.

Besides being a money raiser, the programme also provides competition which leads the national runoff prior to a game at Jarry Park in front of the Expos. The top 2 runners from each team will have a runoff in Simcoe on Saturday June 16th at 2 p.m. Hagersville teams will have their tryouts this Sunday afternoon with the Tykes at 2 p.m., then the Fee Wees followed by the Bantams and Midgets.

The teams retain 60% of the money collected with the remainder being split between the S.C.B.A., the O.B.A. and the C.F.A.B.

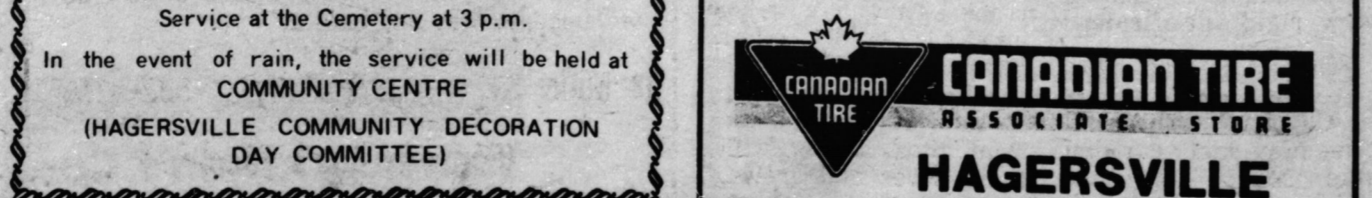
