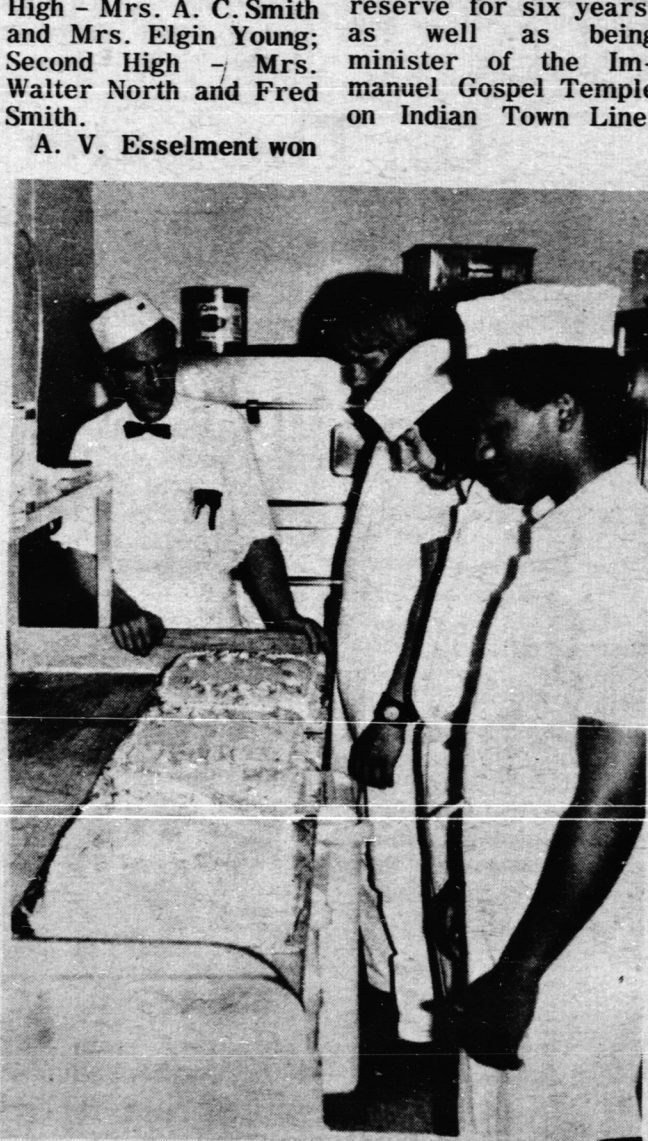

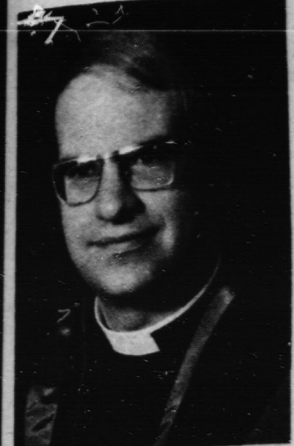

Three Injured In Collision

Three people were seriously injured in a three car collision on Highway 6 near the 3rd line Sunday.

Raymond King, 23, of 1015 Mohawk Road East, Hamilton and Robert Fussee, 24, of R. R. 2, Simcoe were reported "unconscious and only fair" in the Hamilton General Hospital Tuesday. Rhonda Fussee, wife of Robert was conscious and in fair condition.

Ivan Miklavic, 44, of R. R. 1 Hagersville, driver of the third car, escaped injury.

According to Cayuga O.P.P., Mr. King was driving south on Highway 6 when his car and Mr. Miklavic's northbound vehicle brushed just north of Hagersville.

Mr. King's car continued on and collided head-on with Mr. Fussee's vehicle. Both the King and Fussee car were wrecked while the Miklavic car sustained \$700 damage.

Mr. Fussee, whose car plunged down a 20 foot embankment was trapped inside his crushed vehicle for two hours.

The car was towed half-way up the embankment while firefighters from Hagersville washed down fuel from the ruptured gasoline tank. Caledonia firefighter Gord McWilliams spent about an hour cutting Mr. Fussee free.

A doctor and nurse attended Mr. Fussee at the scene and the Hamilton Fire department emergency car was summoned for assistance.

A crowd quickly gathered and traffic was backed up for more than a mile at times. Police had to cordon the area with ropes.

Charges are pending.

No Leisure For Firemen

Hagersville Volunteer Firemen headed by Fire Chief William McClarty, spent a most active weekend, when three various calls were received by their Department.

Saturday afternoon, June 2, at 5 p.m., a lawn mower belonging to

Peter Stasiuk, 51 Main St. South Hagersville, ignited into flames while in use. The fire was quickly extinguished upon arrival of the firemen, with slight damage resulting.

Sunday afternoon, June 3, a call was received at 2:20 p.m. for the aid of the Hagersville Volunteer Firemen to the scene of a multiple - three - car accident two miles north of Hagersville. One of the victims of the accident was pinned in his automobile for more than two hours before being extricated by the firemen. The saw purchased by the Fire Department one year ago for emergencies such as this was used to assist in his removal from the entangled wreckage.

Later Sunday evening, June 3 at 11:35 p.m., the Volunteer Firemen were once again called to a small fire at 23 Alma Street South. The home owned by Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Moody and occupied by several senior citizens. Damage was slight. The fire was caused by a burning cigarette in one of the rooms upstairs.
