**Tykes Lose Game**

The Hagersville Credit Union Tykes travelled to Aylmer on Saturday and gave the undefeated home team a real scare, before losing in the last inning 11-9. This was by far the best effort put out by the kids this year and with a break could well have won.

**'73 Chevelle Takes Race**

Harold Brown of Brantford drove a 1973 Chevelle to victory Friday at Cayuga International Speedway before a near capacity crowd.

In winning, the 38 year old garage owner took a slim lead in two points funds, a \$5,000 Red Cap fund for Cayuga International Speedway championship and a \$10,000 fund established by Cayuga and London's Delaware International Speedway.

Brown took the lead on the last lap of the 30 lap Red Cap feature to win his first Cayuga International Speedway feature event in Late Model "Super Stock"

racing. Finishing second was Ross May of Mt. Hope in a 1970 Camard while third went to Art Clark of West Seneca N.Y., also in a Camaro.

Brown's win was his first ever in this division, in more than 16 years of racing. His best previous finish at Cayuga was a second June 16, 1972 and two third place finishes May 12 and Aug. 25 of last year.

The race got off to a wild start as on the second lap, Toronto's Norm Lelliott slid out of control on the main straight and when he got his Camaro under control again, he took up

last spot in the 24 car starting field. May took the lead on his seventh tour of the 5-8 mile super speedway and held it until lap 25.

An eight car crash on lap 12 brought out the caution flag and although no drivers were hurt, two cars were eliminated from the race. They were London's Earl Ross and London's Ron Pearn.

Makara took the lead on lap 25, but lost it on lap 27 when a slower car spun taking Makara with him. May moved back into the lead, but was passed by Brown on the last lap.

**Dragway Park Hosts Canadian Championship**



The Professional Categories of Drag Racing, Top Fuel, Funny Car and Pro Stock, will be competing at Dragway Park's All Pro "Canadian Championship" this Sunday.

Top Fuel driver Jeb Allen, drag racing's most outstanding teenager and his 1600 horse-

power Chrysler "Hemi" racing engine will catapult him to speeds over 230 m.p.h. in less than six and one half seconds, as he competes in an eight car field of nitromethane fuel burning dragsters.

Also competing will be an eight car field of Funny Cars, which

are specially constructed tubular chassis and engines similar to those of the fuel dragster class, but with fiberglass replicas of production car bodies. Featured racers in this category will be "Jungle" Jim Liberman.

Pro Stock Eliminator, the rapidly growing drag

racing category will include Don Grother, Richard Maskin, Wayne Gapp, Larry Huff, Ron Hutter, Paul Blevins and Mike Fons. Pro Stockers trip the quarter mile timers in the low 9-second range with top speeds approaching 150 m.p.h.

Bonus eliminator money will be paid in all sportsman categories at Dragway Park, Cayuga, for this special event. A full field of Competition, Modified, Super Stock, Stock and E.T. brackets will be competing for a cash purse of \$2400 and points in the 1973 "Red Cap" point awards. Gates open at 10 a.m. and the All Pro "Canadian Championship" at 3 p.m.

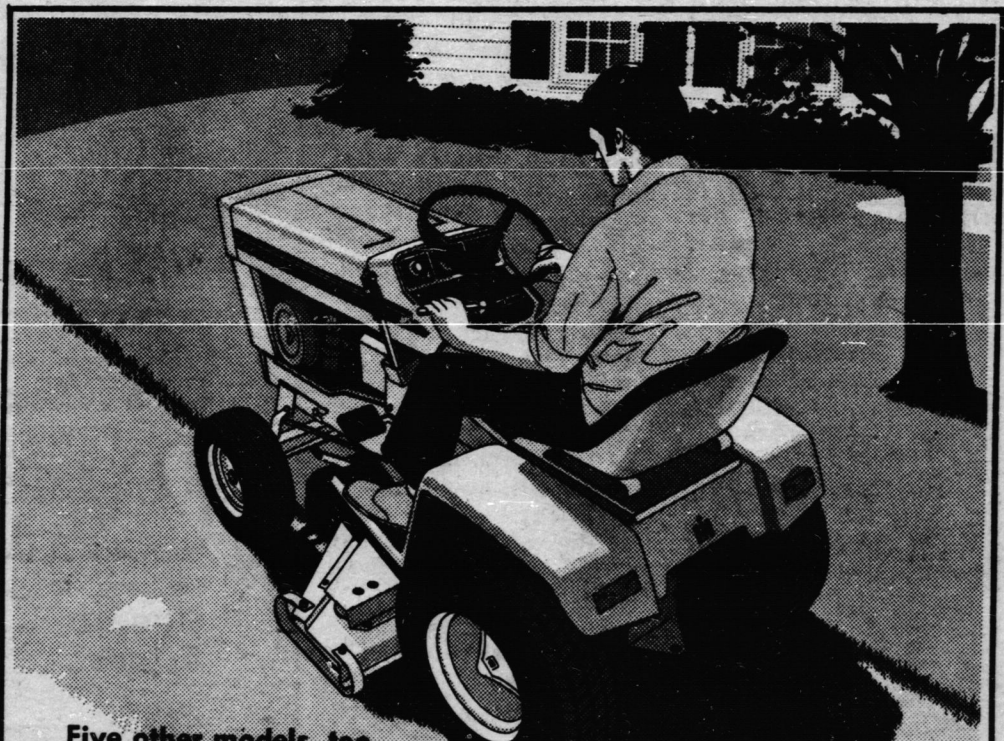
