

Canada's Oil And Gas Reserves Eyed By U.S.

Chatham - Canada's proven gas reserves "are such that we cannot afford to squander them either through misuse in our own country or through irresponsible export selling," Union Gas President Bruce F. Willson told shareholders at the recent Company's Annual Meeting.

"The U.S.," he added, "is eyeing Canada's modest reserves of conventional oil and natural gas to help tide

it over until the hoped-for technological solution of the 1980's comes to the rescue.

"Canada could be left without economically located conventional reserves and would have to rely on high cost frontier reserves or substitute fuels."

Mr. Willson warned that "The competitive enterprise system cannot, on its own, do the job of ensuring the availability of any country's energy requirements."

Mr. Willson told shareholders that the fiscal year which ended last March 31st "was a year of satisfactory progress for Union Gas." He said that the Company is planning to expand sales by 10 per cent in the current fiscal year and that this amount is consistent with the anticipated increase in available supplies. He estimated that the number of customers would increase by 15,000 and said that

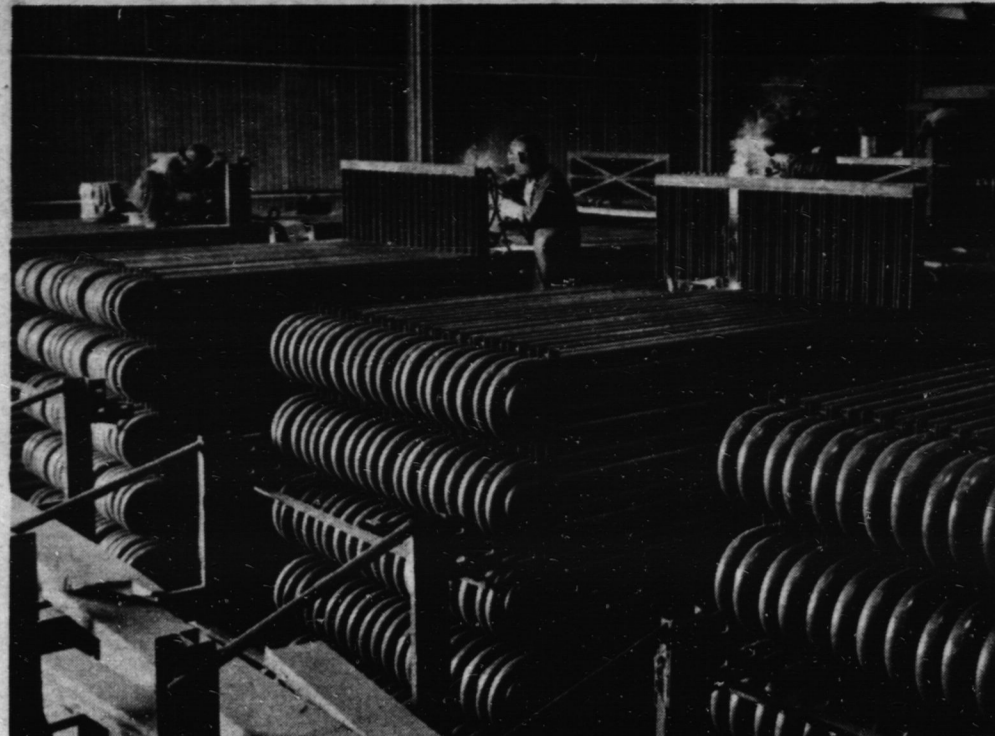
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Good News For Farmers

Information has been received by Dave Wilson Sr., Clerk for the Township of Walpole, that the Farm Tax Reduction Program is being continued for 1973, and the province will be responsible, as in previous years, for making direct payments to eligible farm owners in Ontario.

This year the grant will be increased to 50% of the municipal taxes levied on farm properties. The province intends to ensure, however, that the benefits go to owners of genuine farms, and to this end a committee has been set up by the Minister of Agriculture and Food to properly define a farm.

Nanticoke G.S. Target — Complete Boiler Construction In 1976

Construction of the first boiler unit for Ontario Hydro's Nanticoke G.S. was started in 1971; the 8 units will be completed at intervals of approximately 8 months until 1976.

Hundreds of sections of platens, superheater, and economizer elements, weighing as much as 65 tons will arrive by rail during the construction of Nanticoke's eight boilers. Wall platens, superheater sections and economizer sec-

tions are fabricated at the Galt works of Babcock and Wilcox Canada for Ontario Hydro's Nanticoke G. S.

Platens are sections of boiler wall created by welding tubes together in a side by side sheet. The platens arrive in sections to be welded into place in the 20 storey boiler bay.

The Nanticoke G. S. boiler can produce as much as 3,600,000 pounds of steam per hour at 2450 PSI and 1000 degrees Fah-
