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is saturated (it still contains water). It will be dried out and heated to a higher temperature as it passes through the superheater.

The superheater is positioned near the top of the boiler, just below the steam drum.
Constructing The Platens & Tubes

The first step in construction of the platens; or superheater sections is tube preparation. The tubes are brought from an outside warehouse and cleaned with a jet spray of hot solvent before a shot blast cleans the tube down to white metal.

The tubes are cut to the proper length and put on the weld preparation. They are pre-stencilled and color coded for future identification.

Tubes for wall platens are laid on tables below the membrane welding machines. Spacing bars keep the tubes in position while the membranes are welded between the tubes. Each of the two membrane welding machines at the Galt Tube Shop have six welding heads. They can lay a weld up to 143

feet long and produce wall platens up to 10 feet, ten inches wide. The platen sections are bent after the platens have been assembled and welded together; there is no pre-bending. A 450 ton Pacific press shapes the platen bends.

In some cases, the tubing will be studded on one of three stud welding units. Studding increases tube life where the tube is to be subjected to excessive heat. Studs can be round, flat, or lens type depending on the design of the unit.

Close tube bends are done on a hot bending unit; most of the tubing is cold bend on one of five machines. Three of the cold bend machines are equipped to permit pre-setting of bend locations and degrees for multiple tube bending. This avoids costly individual layout of the tubes. Longer sections of tubes are butt welded on a gas push-up welder. Many grades of steel are used for the platen, superheater, and economizer tubing bound for the Nanticoke G. S. boilers.
