The superheater is positioned near the top of the boiler, just below the steam drum. Constructing The Platens & Tubes

The first step in construction of the platens or superheater sections is tube preparation. The tubes are brought from an outside warehouse and cleaned with a jet spray of hot solvent before a shot blast cleans the tube down to white metal.

The tubes are cut to the proper length and put on the weld preparation. They are stencilled and color coded for future identification. Tubes for wall platens

are laid on tables below the membrane welding machines. Spacing bars keep the tubes in position while the membranes are welded between the tubes.
