Curran Wins Two

Randy Curran pitched two complete games and won both of them in the past week to give the Hagersville Juvies a winning streak of three straight. Curran who has pitched only in spot performances before, looks like he is the top pitcher on the staff right now after his last two outings.

In the first game against Walsingham Randy was racked for 10 hits and 6 runs but was tough in the clutch to hang in and come up with a 12-6 win. He allowed just one base on balls while striking out 7, with 4 of them coming with men in scoring position.

The Hagersville nine were pounding two Walsingham pitchers for 14 hits with Dean Webb and Danny Donato having 3 each. One of Donato's was a triple. Jim Vanni, Paul Fryett and Curran had two hits apiece, with singles going to John Montour and Jim McGrath.

On Monday night in a wild scoring game against Paris the home team came from behind to score a 10-9 victory. Curran was racked for 5 runs in the 3rd inning but coach Denny Wilson elected to go with the young pitcher and he had enough left in the last inning to strike out two men with runners on 2nd and 3rd. Some poor fielding put Curran in trouble but the visiting Paris club was also hitting the ball right on the nose with starting pitcher Cruikshank getting 3 with one a ground rule double when a ball cleared the centre field fence after one bounce. Hume unloaded a bases full blast to deep right centre for the only other long ball off Curran and it cleared the bases in the 6th. In only three innings did the visitors score runs but they came in bunches.

The Legion team kept picking away with 2 runs in the first, one in the 4th, 2 in the 5th and 3 in the 6th. The home team scored the tying run in the last of the 8th. With one out Fryett walked and was sacrificed to second on a perfect bunt by John Montour who also caught a great game. Craig McKee got his second hit of the night to score Fryett.

With darkness closing in, the Hagersville team settled in the last of the 9th with a story book ending. Craig Vanni struck out to open the inning. Randy Curran popped to second to send most of the fans hustling to their cars. The usually weak hitting David House, stroked a clean single for his second hit of the night to keep some life in the team. Danny Donato then

came through with his 5th hit of the night, a long double off the right field fence. With two out House was off and running and still slid in under the tag by Hume at home plate for the winning run.

Rumor has it that House was celebrating his birthday, if so what a present for the whole team. Donato played a strong game at short to go with his heavy hitting. Louie and Denny were seen buying some new lumber before the game, maybe this is the answer for the other teams.

Hagersville Police Report

Please find, in the following, the monthly activities of the Hagersville Department, for May 1973.

The rainy month of May appeared to have had affect on people's driving, in that the officers investigated eight

motor vehicle collisions over \$200 and three motor vehicle collisions under \$200. There were 42 charges laid under the Highway Traffic Act; two charges under the M.V.A.C.A. - "no insurance"; 13 parking tags issued; three charges

under By-law regulating parking; 34 traffic warnings and several assists to stranded motorists.

The department investigated and charged five persons under the criminal code; four charges under the Liquor Control Act; arrested three persons, investigated three occurrences, answered nine requests of assistance, and served seven summonses; all for other forces.

The department recorded 221 general complaints, found three business premises insecure, received two requests for unoccupied house checks, reported three persons missing; two adults and one child, all found. The officers patrolled 3,818 miles in the department auto.

ATTENTION! CYCLISTS! Your bicycle is considered a vehicle under the Highway Traffic Act and is subject to all the laws governing the use, safety, equipment of same. Parents, set a good example by obeying all these laws. STOP at STOP SIGNS, TRAFFIC LIGHTS, SIGNAL ALL OF YOUR TURNS, RIDE WITH TRAFFIC on the ROADWAY as close to the right edge of the pavement or gravel as is safe and practical, NOT ON SIDEWALKS!, while riding after sunset or under poor atmospheric conditions, there must be a white light or amber light to the front, and a red light or reflector to the rear of the bicycle, including tricycles, and in addition, white reflective tape on the rear forks; tape on the front forks and red reflective tape on the rear forks; 10" x 1". Help Us Teach our children the safe way. Thank-you.

On June 16, 1973, at 7:40 a.m., a one car collision on No. 56 Highway, one mile north of Highway No. 3, North Cayuga Township, fatally injured the driver who was tentively identified as Michael Ed-wardson, age 19, 60 Windward St., St. Catharines, Ontario. Ed-wardson was southbound on No. 56 Highway, drove off the east ditch causing \$1,800.00 damage to his vehicle. Ed-wardson was killed as a result of injuries. Prov. Const. R. Coutts investigated, assisted by Corporal G. E. Foster.

On June 15, 1973, Prov. Const. G. Miller with the assistance of the Hagersville Police Department recovered two stolen autos along No. 6 Highway, Township. One stolen from Hamilton the other stolen from Caledonia. The Hamilton youths (one a juvenile) have been charged as a result of this investigation.

On June 16, 1973, one 9 year old child was struck on the Lakeshore Road, Rainham Township, while fishing from a small narrow bridge and stepping back onto the roadway without first looking to see if it was safe to do so. Parents are reminded to instruct their children to play well away from the roadway especially with the summer holidays just around the corner.

During the period, the officer of this detachment investigated 60 occurrences of various nature which included 17 criminal investigations resulting in 6 criminal charges being laid, 6 Liquor Control Act investigations resulting in six Liquor Control Act charges

being laid and one Petty Trespass Act investigation. A total of 12 motor vehicle collisions were investigated - one fatal, two personal injury and 9 property damage. A Mustang bicycle was found on the 2nd Line, Oneida Township, and is presently stored at this Detachment office. Anyone having any information regarding this bicycle please contact Cayuga OPP, 772-3322. The owner may have the bicycle by identifying same. A safety reminder to the motorist - Section 100 (2) of the Highway Traffic Act states: The driver of a motor vehicle shall not overtake and pass to the right of another vehicle where such movement can not be made in safety and in no event shall a driver make such movement by driving off the roadway. Many motorists seem to be unfamiliar with this section.
